- ♣ Volunteers at the Old Fort rebuilt the northeast corner of the stockade fence that was damaged. Thank you to all those who helped rebuild the structure.
- Recently met with the Marketing Team, along with Tim Byers, Foellinger Theatre Manager, to work through advertising for the various shows we are producing this summer. Tim also had several new shows to plan for announcements.
- ♣ Alec and I presented the Franke Park Renaissance project to City Council for their approval of the funding and bids. This was approved and the team is working on contracts and purchase orders. Work to start in May.
- ♣ Gary Whitacre and I recorded the latest podcast covering golf. It was a little unique because we had a visitor from the Journal Gazette doing an article about podcasts in government. I am guessing that article will be coming out soon.
- ♣ Sandra and I started the discussion with the computer group Resultant on a Business Continuity Plan for the department. This is to determine minimum requirements from us if there was a serious event that disrupted our computer/telephone connectivity with the rest of the city.
- ♣ We held our latest public meeting for Foster Golf. This was to get our survey completed for those who have not done so via a digital format. We had almost 40 completed on paper. These results were shared with the design team and they are working on a new version of the master plan.
- ↓ I met with Kelly Updike of the Embassy Theatre to discuss Middle Waves Music Festival. They are in the process of acquiring the name of the festival as they see it has strong ties to the community. They are shooting for a small festival later this summer at Parkview Field.
- ↓ I gave an update to the Park Foundation towards the end of the month. This was their second meeting for the year.
- ♣ We had a few media events towards the end of the month. The first was the dedication of Foster Pavilion #3. This was well attended by the groups involved with the project. Later that week we sent off the School Children's Flower and Vegetable plants to area elementary schools. This was a photo op event. We closed out the month with another press conference celebrating Arbor Day. An annual event for us, where we celebrated the 33rd year of being designated a Tree City as well as the 18th year for the Tree Growth Award.
- We held our first Advisory Committee meeting for the Comprehensive Plan. This group will meet 4 to 5 times throughout this planning process.
- We also held our kick-off meeting for the Brewer Park Master Plan design. The team went through all aspects of the project to make sure we were all on the same page. It will take several months for them to work from schematics to construction drawings. We hope to bid out the project by the end of the year.

Riverfront

- April at Promenade Park seems like the calm before the storm. The warm spring weather begins to bring more patrons to the park as we get ready for summer programming and business summer rentals. Yoga on the Riverfront continued on April 16th with a larger crowd than normal as the warm spring air got people out and ready.
- Followed by yoga was our Sunday Heritage Concert Series in the pavilion with the Fort Wayne Children's Choir. This group was assembled by local Fort Wayne students who brought out their families to enjoy some magnificent singing with the great acoustics of the Pavilion.
- Riverfront Programs concluded in April with the first-ever Literacy Expo at the Pavilion to celebrate World Book Day. The event kicked off with live poetry reading from local artists. The pavilion was packed full of local non-profit organizations that support literacy programming in Fort Wayne including the Fort Wayne Library, Boys and Girls Club, PBS Fort Wayne, and much more. Kids and families began to pack the pavilion by the midafternoon to complete the literacy scavenger hunt and participate in the Human Library on the patio of the pavilion.

♣ Golf

- Dave Weadock, Bryan Keister, Gary Whitacre and Jason Smith held a fourth public meeting for the
 redesign of Foster Golf Course. The meeting was simply for those who hadn't filled out the online
 survey. It was well attended by around 100 people. The mentioned staff cleared up a lot of
 confusion that was being circulated. The vast majority of participants thanked the staff when they
 left for answering questions and clearing up confusion. Also, for taking the time to host the meeting.
- Gary Whitacre stated that the Spring weather has been up and down for steady golf play. The positive aspect is that when the weather has been nice, the golf courses are packed for the day. Players are ready to play.
- Gary Whitacre reported that the Foster Park Golf Course hosted the Concordia Invitational which had 22 teams. Despite the early wet conditions, the tournament was a huge success. Numerous coaches, players, and parents commented on how nice the course looked and played.
- Bryan Keister reported that City Utilities finally came back and replaced the new water meter. He also reported that the Parks and Recreation Department MTs were reinstalling the irrigation motor and pump that were damaged by the flood conditions in the pump house.

Pools

• Daryn Schwartz reported that job applications for summer pool staff are starting to trickle in. Jenny Barney is continuing to interview potential pool staff as well as attending high school job fairs to get the word out about jobs.

Athletics and Special Events

- Jason Smith reported that the Lifetime Sports Academy staff has been hired and were even able to hire an additional golf position that couldn't be filled last year.
- Jason Smith and Dave Scudder met with Parkview Sports Medicine to film a promotional piece to push registrations for the Junior and Pee Wee Golf Tour.

• Jason Smith reported that the Fort Wayne Disc Golf Club hosted its annual spring tournament at Shoaff Park. As always, it was a huge success. Brian Miller (disc golf tournament coordinator) reported that they had 260 players sign-up within 10 minutes of opening registration. The tournament continues to be one of the most heavily attended in the state.

🖊 Salomon Farm Park

- Four Learning Center rentals were booked in March 2023 which was the same amount of bookings as March 2022.
- Thirteen Farmin' Fun Day Camp applicants have confirmed for the 2023 camp season, with three interviews still set up. Fourteen staff were hired in 2022.
- Farmin'Fun Day 4-5-year-old program, 6-11-year-old program, and the Farmer-In-Training 12+ are all sold out. With additional camp counselor personnel, the maximum number of children can be increased for each session. Farmin' Fun Day Camp needs 3-4 more camp counselors.
- New animal additions were released to the public on Tuesday, April 18, 2023. To celebrate the new animals Salomon Farm Park is hosting a special meet & greet with the Highland mini calves in May. Participants can be the first to interact with the calves and welcome them to Fort Wayne and Salomon Farm Park. The private session includes 30 minutes of exclusive interaction for up to 4 people. Brush, feed, pet and take pictures from your cell phone with the adorable Highland calves. The Highland calf's names are *Mickey, 7 months old*, and *Frankie who is 4 months old*. On Tuesday, April 18, 2023, after the press release, the 8 interactive sessions sold out within 1 hour. More sessions were then added through May. WANE 15, WPTA, and FOX 55 all scheduled appointments to get footage of the new animals, including the three baby Norwegian goats. The anticipated revenue from the meet & greet session is \$2,600. In May Salomon is offering 40 total sessions, 2 of the 40 sessions are still available.
- Salomon Farm Park in partnership with the Allen County Public Library held two Storytime on the Farm programs. Storytime is an interactive way to develop children's love of reading. Participants listen to stories, sing songs, and even make animal sounds. Ages 2 6 with an adult. Registration for the Storytime was free. After the program participants could stay for a hay ride around the farm. The hay ride was \$5 per person with ages 2 and under free. The Friday, April 7, 2023, Storytime had 35 participants, and the Friday, April 21, 2023, Storytime had 25 participants. This was a new program.





Lindenwood Nature Preserve

• On Sunday, April 16, 2023, Lindenwood Nature Preserve worked with the Purdue Fort Wayne Chapman Scholars on an invasive removal day. Students braved the rainy weather and helped remove invasive plants and spread mulch on some of the trails. In attendance were 6 students from PFW.

Sweet Breeze

- Final interviews for Sweet Breeze 2023 staff have been completed. Amanda Black and Eden Lamb are coordinating hiring and start dates with staff. All positions have been filled. The operation is welcoming 6 new staff members.
- Specialty tours and general public tours will be released to the public on Wednesday, May 3, 2023.

Hurshtown Reservoir

• Warmer April weather allowed maintenance crews to install Hurshtown docks earlier than the week before opening day. Hurshtown staff are all cleared to work and ready to open the season on Tuesday, May 2, 2023.

Franke Park Day Camp

- Franke Park Day Camp will be hiring 20 camp counselors. Ideally, camp supervisors would like to hire 8 more counselors.
- The 4-5-year-old program, 6-11-year-old program, and the Junior Leader program are sold out. With additional camp counselor personnel, the maximum number of children can be increased for each session.

McMillen Park Community Center

- This month we had our annual Spring Break Carnival. We were fortunate to have the National Guard bring an obstacle course to the carnival. The staff and some of the members of the National Guard interacted and enjoyed play time with the children. We also partnered with Kanvas Creations by Kasey. She is a local business owner who draws pictures on canvases for you to purchase. She supplied the with 40 canvases for the children to paint Easter pictures. The children enjoyed painting the holiday pictures. We also did an Easter egg hunt competition for each age group. The After-School program wrapped up this month as well. Two program youths were presented with awards for consistent participation, leadership, and behavior. We also came up with the McMillen Character Award. Which will be something we do each time, it is an award that will go to a student who is an all-around great kid they do well in school and at the center.
- Kids Korner had a 25% decrease from last month compared to this month. Last month we had over 1,100 patrons. visit the Kids Korner. Due to the youth being out for Spring break and the youth program hour change during this period, Kids Korner had 650 patrons compared to the previous month. We continue to have daycares and preschool facilities that visit with us every month. We have several parents, grandparents, and home-school groups that continue to utilize Kid Korner.
- Registrations continue to rise as we proceed into the summer months. There was a slight 10% decrease at this time compared to last month in which there were 86 registrations and so far this month there are only 69 registrations. We've been getting quite a few registrations daily because our Youth Summer Program will be starting on June 5, 2023. Parents are looking for a safe fun, safe environment to drop their child/children off for their summer break. We have new students coming to our center daily and not only are the children excited but the parents are excited as well.

- Open gym and Pickleball had a 20% decrease in participation due to patrons utilizing outside courts. Our men's 18 and over Thursday basketball league completed this month. We had a total of 6 teams in the league with an average of 8 players per team which is around 48 players a week that participated in our league for April. Our cardio fit numbers were down this month because the teacher of the class took some time off. Pickleball is still a fan favorite here from 9:00-2:00 pm In April we had 332 athletes come in and play Pickleball. Every Saturday we have Yoga in the mornings, this month 13 people came to Saturday Yoga classes.
- On April 1st we partnered with the Autism Society of Indiana and Easter Seals of ARC of Northeast Indiana to host our first-ever "Parents night out" evening. The night went great and we had 8 wonderful children join us, we are hoping to double that number going forward. We have interest from the community in utilizing this service.

Lommunity Center (Downtown/233 West Main Street)

- April was a busy month with ten rental events. There were four Saturday and five Sunday rentals for this April. There were two open Saturdays with no rentals. Each month/year is different from the previous month/year, which is dependent on several factors. Post-pandemic demand is still strong and the weather was favorable this month. Bookings for the year are behind pre-pandemic levels. There are still lots of Saturdays in August and September available that are usually booked by April.
- Pods staff are being staffed with full-time teachers for the summer. Hiring is going well, still need tennis and athletic staff. Candidates have enjoyed the flexibility of taking a Zoom interview with difficult schedules Recruitment letters were sent to 8 more high schools (athletic directors).
- The new carpet installation in the lobby and upstairs areas is complete and looks great! Everyone loves it!
- Most of the community center staff attended a dementia simulation presented by Emily Osborne to help us understand dementia from the afflicted person's point of view. It was very profound.
- Linda and Mary attended the first senior expo at the Jackson Lehman Yucca. We were there to introduce people to the community center and the activities that we offer. We spoke to approx. 85 people during the 3 hours we were there. Josh and Mary will be attending the volunteer expo on April 27th at the mall for volunteer recruitment purposes.

- ♣ We have two upcoming seasonal hiring events in early May. The first is for our summer Aquatic staff and the second is for Franke and Salomon Farms Day Camps.
- ♣ Seasonal hiring for Foellinger Theatre is now complete.
- Hurshtown Reservoir is fully staffed, opens on May 2nd, and is ready for the public to come out and enjoy!
- April continued to be a busy month for day camp registrations. This time we were busy contacting the parents of the kids on the waiting lists for Franke Day Camp. The Recreation Staff was able to hire more Franke Day Camp staff so we were able to contact most of the kids that were wait-listed for the summer in the 4-11 age groups and get them registered. Those age groups are full again but there is still the possibility that we will be able to increase those maximums again if more staff is found.
- ♣ We began working on building the Sweet Breeze tickets and web ticket sales page for the summer/fall of 2023. There will be 189 tours offered this year. Tickets for these tours go on sale May 3rd.
- Foellinger Theatre continues to add concerts to its schedule. We are now up to selling tickets to 13 concerts. The Summer concert series opens on May 16th with Brit Floyd as the first act of this year!
- Front office staff entered 322 summer Fun Times programs into our software system to prepare for summer registration which begins May 3rd.
- ♣ Campground reservations have been steady. The main office processes reservations for the Johnny Appleseed
 Campground from January 1st April 30th until the campground hosts move in for the season and start handling the
 reservations on May 1st.
- ♣ Beginning May 1st, we will have all 22 of our pavilions available for rent. This includes the newest pavilion for rental, Foster #3!
- ♣ We are performing preliminary work on the 2024 Budget preparation with the various Deputy Directors.

- The main pump and sustain pump for the Foster Park golf course irrigation system had to be removed due to a water maintenance issue that caused the pump house to flood. New pumps will be reinstalled once they are available.
- Work was completed at the Downtown Community Center to facilitate the opening of the new sensory room.
- Work continues to restore water service to the seasonal facilities/amenities for the 2023 season. All service will be restored by mid-May.
- Pool preparation work has begun at both Northside and McMillen Parks, in anticipation of another great swimming year.
- Lighting upgrades were completed at Shoaff Park's golf pro shop, Weisser Park's shelter, and the Botanical Conservatory.
- Windscreens and 2 new nets were installed at the Swinney Park tennis center.
- Winter covers for the fountains at Freimann Square were removed allowing for work to be completed to ready the fountains for the 2023 season.

- The steering committee met for the first time for the Parks Comprehensive Plan. Project goals were discussed, as well as a timeline and brief project overview. Public input and stakeholder meetings are scheduled for the end of May.
- Construction continues on the St. Marys Streambank Stabilization: Phase II project. Stabilization is complete on the upstream portion of the project, and construction has begun on the downstream portion and canoe landing area. Despite fluctuating river levels, progress has remained steady and the project remains on schedule for May completion.
- A kickoff meeting was held with JPR for the Brewer Park Redevelopment project. Construction documents are scheduled to be completed in time for October-November bidding for construction.
- A grant proposal was completed and submitted to Erie Insurance Co. for the Wells St. Park Redevelopment project. This project was prompted by the Bloomingdale Neighborhood Association and Wells Business Corridor; no funding is currently available for the project, but the award of grant dollars could help kickstart construction.
- The Sons of Glory Monument paver project was completed in April (see picture below).
- Lighting was installed for the 'Megaflora' sculpture at the Conservatory.
- Bids were received for a landscape renovation in the sunken gardens at Lakeside Park; Harlow will be completing these improvements in May.
- Chad attended the first year of the two-year Executive Development Program at Indiana University. Topics covered in the training included Customer Service, Risk Management, Leadership, Challenging Traditional Approaches, and Dealing with Change.
- The Staff has been researching the Inflation Reduction Act, searching for possible funding opportunities for Parks projects and initiatives.
- Staff met regularly with Conservatory management to discuss various agreements, staff training, marketing, showcase, and facility operations. Progress continues to be made on the various capital projects within the facility that were discovered through the facility assessment and internal discussions.

♣ Horticulture and Landscape Report- April 2023

- Show change was completed the week of the 16th at the Botanical Conservatory; the "California Dreamin" exhibit was removed and the "Color In Motion" Butterfly exhibit was installed.
- Landscape staff helped out in the greenhouse and delivered plants for the SCFVA the week of April 23rd.
- Gardeners continued spring clean-ups throughout the parks. Clean-ups include debris and litter removal, pruning/deadheading, pre-emergent application, bed edging, and mulching. Parks worked on included Little Turtle, Japanese Garden, Franke Park entry beds, Swinney Letterbed, McMillen Community Center, Lakeside, and Foster Park.
- Rose pruning and un-hilling were completed at the Lakeside Rose Gardens.
- Landscape staff worked on the turf in Freimann Square, reseeding a north-facing hillside in the park. Foster Park and Lakeside Park also began doing some turf re-seeding.
- Lakeside Park re-planted native sedges in select bare areas around the pond that had been disturbed by patrons and geese over the past years.
- The Freimann Square fountain was cleaned and filled. Fountains were turned on at the end of the month.
- Approximately 8 acres in Buckner Park were seeded with native wildflowers and grasses. This has been an ongoing project since 2021. An RFQ will go out for long-term maintenance in May.
- Pride Landcare and Mow Baby Mow began mowing all contracted maintenance areas.
- Contracted bed cleanup and mulching were finished by Pride Landcare in early April.
- Triscape, Inc mulched Promenade Park in April per contract.
- Lawnganics continued turf fertilization and weed control on all park locations under contract.
- Myers Plant Health Care began treating several select trees at Promenade and Lakeside for insects, fungi, and improved tree health.
- Heartland Restoration Services has rewarded a contract that includes all maintenance of native landscapes at Thomas Nature Sanctuary Pond, Kreager Rain Gardens, Reservoir Rain Garden, Lakeside Pond buffer, and the Salomon Farms swale. Work will begin in early May.
- Heartland Restoration Services completed a native plant buffer seeding around the pond at the Thomas Nature Sanctuary. This has been an ongoing project since 2022.
- One seasonal employee began work in April.

4 Riparian Management Report- April 2023

- Guldlin dock, Promenade kayak launch, and Shoaff dock were successfully installed for the upcoming rec season. Headwaters are pending and awaiting minor repair.
- Work barge continued clearing the Main Street bridge, MLK bridge, Old Fort pedestrian bridge, and Spy

Run bridge, along with several mid-channel navigational hazards and deadheads. The total debris removed by the barge for the month was 108,539 pounds (54.3 tons).

- Herbivory management continued with geese egg addling. Ten nests were found with a total of 60 eggs added.
- Sweet Breeze's fire system was inspected and cleared for the season. The launch is scheduled and coordinated with towing and FWPD escort for the beginning of May.
- Completed two volunteer events removing honeysuckle with Concordia students along St Joseph River. There were 24 students and adults, which totaled 72 work hours and removed 6,180 pounds (3.09 tons) of honeysuckle.
- Completed the Volunteer Engagement webinar education series.

♣ Forestry Report- April 2023

- This year's Arbor Day celebration was held at McCormick Park on Friday, April 28^{th,} and was a success. The tree seedling giveaway was met with enthusiasm despite the weather.
- Nearly 2,700 pecan tree seedlings were distributed to area third-graders. The Homestead Highschool Environmental Club students and the School Children Flower and Vegetable Association deserve a big THANK YOU for all of their work that made this possible.
- Forestry began reviewing a potential federal grant opportunity. The Inflation Reduction Act Grant supports urban forestry efforts in disadvantaged communities. Over one-half of our inventoried trees are located in designated disadvantaged communities.
- Forestry Staff completed 7 tree-related property damage appraisals totaling \$4,590.00 in damages. The vast majority of these are the result of vehicles losing control and striking City-owned trees.
- This year's spring tree planting is well underway. The bulk of this planting is funded through the Southwest Area Partnership. The planting locations were prioritized to benefit elementary schools and students in the 4th district.
- In April, Forestry crews completed 29 out-of-cycle tree maintenance requests. Examples of these requests include tree limb elevation to facilitate buses, removal of limbs touching homes, clearing street lighting and signage, and removal of dead limbs. We expect these to become more common as the routine maintenance cycle timeframe extends.
- 203 trees were removed this month. 154 of these were contracted and completed by Custom Tree Care.
- Forestry crews responded to 26 storm-related fallen/hanging limbs.
- Forestry staff responded to and resolved 76, 311 call center tickets this month.
- California Dreamin' wrapped up on April 16 and whisked 28,984 visitors into a 1960s-1970s era-inspired Venice Beach, Los Angeles, California. On April 25, the 20th annual Color in Motion: Live Butterfly Exhibit welcomed its first visitors, this nine-week exhibit will last until June 25 with an anticipated attendance of over 25,000 visitors. The Botanical Conservatory hosted several well-received events in April 2023 including Slightly Used Bulb Sale (April 6-30), Bunny Tales in the Garden (April 7 & 8), and the Color in Motion Butterfly Showcase Exhibit (Opened April 25). Staff are gearing up for Mother's Day Plant Sale (May 11-14), Mother's Day in the Garden (May 13-14), Spring Bonsai Show (May 20), Iris Show (May 28), 36 scheduled field trips (May 1-31), and the start of indoor/outdoor facility event rentals (May 27).
- A Camp ACTIVenture counselor, Brody Taylor, has completed the hiring and onboarding process. Seasonal Gardeners Kristina Pena and Josie Quack have begun their seasons.

♣ Botanical Conservatory KPIs

• April 2023 began Q2 with an attendance increase of 58% and membership sales up 43% to April 2022. The attendance increase in April 2023 is highly attributable to both more paid attendance and higher member

attendance than in April 2022. Despite a one-week closure for painting, the Conservatory Shop increased nearly 6% to April 2022.

- o Bunny Tales in the Garden (April 7 & 8)
 - This spring event is regaining its pre-Covid level of attraction! In 2019, 2,678 guests visited for a one-day event. Now as a two-day event, Bunny Tales in 2023 attracted 2,713 visitors surpassing the 2019 attendance by 35 visitors. This year also exceeded 2022's two-day event volume of 1,398 visitors nearly double the number. During the event, guests followed a rhyming tale as posted and available on a handout leading them through the gardens where they participated in a craft, received a goody bag, met the Easter Bunny and chose an Easter egg, enjoyed a variety of baby farm animals, and selected a polka dot plant.

- o Friday Night Flights Fundraiser (April 28)
 - This event welcomed guests to the opening of our Color in Motion butterfly exhibit. Guests took advantage of this exclusive opportunity to visit the butterflies and meet German artist Ramon F. Miller. They were also invited to enjoy hors d'oeuvres from Bluspoon and sample wine from Heritage Winery and beer from Hop River Brewing Company, with Hop River providing beverage service.
 - Public Reception & Artist Lecture (April 30)
 Ramon F. Miller shared his inspiration as part of this never before seen collection on display at the Botanical Conservatory that emphasizes change and a lack of control with light and shadow effects at the moment. Visiting from Germany, Ramon spoke to attendees about *randomness* in the current photography display, *Landscape Architecture*, *and Art*. Direct quotes were emphasized from *Theory of Garden Art* by C. C. L. Hirschfeld an original landscape architect who influenced landscapes as we know them today.

4 Education

- o Pysanky: Ukrainian Eggs (April 1)
 - This pre-registered program was brought back due to multiple requests in which 20 registered to achieve max enrollment. The historic, Ukrainian tradition of dyeing and coloring eggs was taught by Conservatory volunteer, Carol Ann Eckrich, and her daughter Karen Eckrich. Participants rated this class highly with 9s and 10s out of a 10-point scale.
- o T'ai Chi Tuesdays (April 25-May 30)
 - Sandy Gebhard has returned to instruct this series exceeding its maximum of 20 whereas 23 participants were able to register. During class, participants are invited to be outside weather permitting. T'ai Chi continues to be a sustainable pre-registered program offered year-round at the Botanical Conservatory.
- o Bonsai for Beginners (April 29)
 - This is another pre-registered program brought back by demand also maxing out with 20 registrants. Staff was pleased to secure 5 members of the Fort Wayne Bonsai Club to instruct the program. The plant species, *Portulacaria* was grown at the Lawton Park Greenhouse and provided to participants who followed step-by-step instructions on bonsai care and maintenance. Participants enjoyed the class and left smiling.

Learning Exhibits & Displays

- o California Dreamin (January 14-April 16)
- This showcase exhibit was overwhelmingly popular with guests returning over and over again! The sunset boardwalk was a favorite spot for photos and especially in front of the nostalgic 1967 VW bus. The lifeguard tower turned into a slide along with sandboxes including sand toys was certainly a favorite for the young, and for the young at heart, there was also beach volleyball, Jenga, ring toss, horseshoes, cornhole, and beach chairs with a whimsical "fire" pit. Seashells and a sandy "succulent and cacti reef' further complimented the aesthetic.

♣ Volunteers/Staff

- Volunteer recruitment has ramped up at this time of year, particularly for Color in Motion and the Mother's Day Plant Sale. The Volunteer Center was successfully utilized to recruit volunteers for both initiatives, attracting about 10 new applicants! During the first week of the butterfly exhibit, 7 first-time Butterfly Attendants were trained. - Springtime in Indiana continues to be eventful year after year. All in all, this has been a fairly normal spring, although temperatures on average continue to be low and precipitation continues to be high compared to the seasonal average. That being said, 2022 was a worse weather year (to date) than '23 has been.
- This is reflected in the revenue numbers to date. When the weather has been conducive, the activity level has been VERY strong:

- 4 By mid-May, all of the leagues will be restarted, and by the end of May, all of the high school and middle school teams that use our courses will be finishing their spring seasons. Multiple outings have been scheduled, and the season looks to be off to a tremendous start.
- ♣ Two contracted instructors have been added, and the availability of instruction should be sufficient to meet the increasing demand. Five-time Fort Wayne City tournament champion and PGA and Champions Tour professional Scott Pieri will be teaching for the Parks Department, as well as Indiana Tech golf coach and PGA Associate Mark Beneke. Along with myself, there is more opportunity than ever to receive professional instruction through the Parks Department.
- ♣ As usual with the age of our cart fleet, we are paying close attention to its serviceability. As the carts are being utilized, we are watching for mechanical issues and repairing them as necessary. The delivery of 17 new carts is anticipated later this year, and 16 more have been approved for purchase and are ordered. This is consistent with our goal of updating and expanding the fleet from the current 88 carts to an eventual total of 110.
- ♣ The Foster Park golf course master plan continues to evolve. After strong feedback from the public through a survey and multiple public meetings, a revised plan staying within the footprint of the existing golf course was created by the architecture firm of Hills Forrest Smith. This plan will be evaluated, and further information will be forthcoming.
- ♣ Overall, the golf season is off to a tremendous start, and there is no reason to believe that it will not continue in a positive direction for the foreseeable future.

- ♣ The Summit Park Trail from the Fishing Line Trail to Lima Rd Trail along the south side of Ludwig Rd (named for the Summit Park Industrial Park) is out for bid.

- ♣ May is Bike Month. One of the first events will be Bike to School Day on May 3rd. We'll be hosting the Bike to Work Day at four event sites on May 19th.
- Three Rivers Horse Trails, Inc. will have a public meeting on May 9th at PBS.
- The County will be opening bids for the equestrian trails in May.
- ♣ I attended the annual Greenways Foundation of Indiana Luncheon in Carmel on 4/25. Jon Bomberger, local attorney, and trail advocate, was the recipient of the "Trail Advocate of the Year" award for the entire state. Jon has helped with

our trails since 2005. He has served as the President of the Greenways Consortium and Fort Wayne Trails. He is also a board member of Fort-4-Fitness and started the Spring Cycle event. He also organizes the May Bike Month event calendar on a website, kickstartfortwayne.com. Jon has also played an instrumental role in the Poka-Bache Coalition and Task Force. It was his vision that led Mayor Henry to gather NE Indiana groups/agencies involved with the trail together in April of 2021 and form the Coalition, which has been meeting monthly.

- ♣ The Greenways and Trails Department will have two interns this summer.
- ↓ I'm a member of an internal City committee working on a new Active Transportation Plan. We just released a community survey on 4/26 to get feedback on bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure.

Volunteers give wings to popular butterfly exhibit – Botanical Conservatory program in 20th year

Foellinger-Freimann Botanical Conservatory - A fan whirred in the mesh enclosure where Jeff Calder was stationed Sunday at the Foellinger-Freimann Botanical Conservatory, but the constant breeze wasn't for his comfort as he allowed visitors to exit the popular live butterfly exhibit.

Instead, Calder said, the airflow deters the insects from straying from their spacious tent. Or at least that's the idea.

As many as eight to 10 butterflies at a time have slipped inside Calder's vestibule, either by hitchhiking on people or by flying inside, said Calder, who had about 30 minutes of training for his volunteer position. He helps visitors check for stowaways before opening the exterior door and bidding them farewell with his standard, "Thank you for coming."

Calder is among the volunteers vital to the nine-week Color in Motion exhibit, said Amanda Amstutz, the Botanical Conservatory's supervisor of public programs and volunteer development.

"This isn't really possible without them," she said.

Now in its 20th year, the butterfly exhibit generates the conservatory's biggest crowds – about 25,000 people per season, Amstutz said. It runs through June 25.

Several dozen people, including 6-year-old Sutton and 4-year-old Everett Steury – waited Sunday afternoon to enter the 30-by-30-foot tent in the conservatory's Showcase Garden. About 30 visitors are allowed inside the space at a time.

"We were practicing our finger," the siblings' mother Cayleigh Steury said, referring to the perch the family would create for the butterflies.

Visiting the butterflies is a tradition for Kelly Rayle and her daughter, Hannah Hogan. The 8-year-old had her hands full – a butterfly rested on each, and a third clung to her shirt.

"I bring her every year," Rayle said, noting she even attended the exhibit when she was pregnant with Hannah. "We love this."

One annual visit isn't enough for the Steurys, who are conservatory members. Cayleigh Steury said her family expects they will see even more butterflies later.

New butterflies are regularly moved out of the hatching lab, where visitors can watch the insects emerge from chrysalises.

"They just multiply like crazy," Cayleigh Steury said.

If the Steurys return on a Sunday, odds are they will encounter Calder. He plans to volunteer every Sunday except one during the exhibit's run.










AT THE COMMUNITY CENTER



City Parks Department Assumed Operations, April 1, 2023

Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation announces that after more than 25 successful years, the Headwaters Park Alliance ended their lease agreement to run Headwaters Park on March 31, 2023. The following day, April 1, 2023, the Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation Department assumed the management and

day-to-day operations of Headwaters Park and plan to work with the Headwaters Park Alliance to ensure a smooth transition for all festivals, park rentals, and other user groups.

Executive Director of the Headwaters Park Alliance Geoff Paddock observes "The Headwaters Park Commission [beginning in 1993] and the Headwaters Park Alliance [beginning in 2001] worked to design, raise private dollars, and build and maintain the Headwaters Park Flood Control Project. Over those past three decades, we have raised almost \$15 million for that purpose." He continues, "It has been a privilege and honor to serve as the Executive Director of this forward-thinking project for 30 years. We now leave Headwaters Park to the able staff of the Parks Department with the substantial festival and ice-skating revenue and a healthy maintenance endowment."

Director of Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation Steve McDaniel states "Fort Wayne Parks looks forward to continuing the culture of excellence developed by the Headwaters Park Alliance to mitigate flooding, enhance economic development, and connect the downtown to opportunities for recreation and outdoor education.
