Steve McDaniel, Director

- We wrapped up the Senior Games this past month. We reached our goal (and then some) of participants with over 525 participating. It was a great 5 weeks of games. Congratulations to all who participated. I hope to see you all next year.
- I presented an update to the Executive Board of the Fort Wayne Zoological Society of the Franke Park Renaissance Plan. This included the plan along with the current timeline.
- We held the press conference for two events this month. The first was the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Buckner Park Trail Project. The second was for a celebration of Jennings Center's 75 Anniversary. Later in the day, we held a carnival at Jennings to incorporate the neighborhood and all of the kids. All events were well attended.
- The city presented its findings from the Compensation Study it has been working on for the last year. A new salary grid was defined and approved. The city also presented four options for implementation and option 3 was discussed as the choice moving forward. We are told that this will be implemented for the August 18th pay period.
- This month I taped our podcast with both Eden Lamb and Amanda Black discussing boating operations and the Sweet Breeze tours. This is available to be downloaded and listened to.
- Rick Kinney joins the staff as the new Foellinger Theatre Manager. Rick has a long career in the theatre field having been part of the Embassy & Clyde Theatres as well as owning his venue consulting firm. We are very excited to have Rick join the team.
- Talking about the Foellinger Theatre, July was a busy month with multiple concerts. This included Hotel California (Eagles tribute), Herman's Hermits, America, Community Band, New Millennium Jazz Orchestra, Welcome Back My Friends: The Return of Emerson Lake and Palmer, the Mavericks, 38th Infantry Division Band, Fort Wayne Children's Choir, and Stayin' Alive.
- This month we ended our 25th season of the Lifetime Sports Academy at McMillen Park. Students earned 50 sets of golf clubs and 25 tennis racquets. Kids participating in the program included 1,735 golf lessons, 1,116 tennis lessons, and 554 swim lessons. This year we had over 850 children participate in the program. Totals over the 25 years have us reaching 31,360 kids.
- The Marketing Team is working on a video that we can use for donations. As we look to build our donor base, this video will be one of the tools we will use.
- The design team working on the Foster Park Golf Master Plan has sent over a revised plan. They are asking for our input before they finalize it. The staff is reviewing it along with the Golf Committee. We hope to share our thoughts and get a revised plan soon.
- The team working on our Comprehensive Plan had stakeholder meetings this past month. A lot of information was shared by those in attendance and will go towards shaping our plans.
- ♣ Summer programs started in the early part of June. So there are a lot of activities in many of our parks.
- Senior Games kicked off on June 5th with our opening ceremonies. Over 40 events are planned for the next 5 weeks. Our goal is to have over 500 participants play in the games.
- Chuck and I met with Police Chief Reed and his commanders regarding large groups of minors in our downtown area causing issues. This spills over into a few of our downtown parks. The Police have set up additional officers to patrol the parks and other locations.
- Rob, Nate, and I met with the Foellinger Foundation this month. It was a good discussion about our two facilities with the Foellinger name on them, Botanical Conservatory and our Theatre. They have asked for some additional information which we are gathering now.
- I was the guest speaker on PBS's Primetime talking about Riverfront development and phase 2 plans. It was a lot of graphics showing what is being proposed in the various areas that encompass phase 2.

- I participated in a biennial wildlife working group at the International Airport. They host this event every other year to help manage wildlife within a 5-mile radius of the airport. This helps them with lowering any possible issues with aircraft and birds.
- We continue to work on building a Parks and Recreation mobile app. This would be a map-based app that would show you the amenities within each of our parks. It would also have location ability so you can see where those amenities are close to you. (blue dot on the map).
- Air quality became an issue this month for the first time. There were a few days that impacted our community. We followed the Indiana Department of Environmental Management and the Allen County Board of Health's recommendations as well as connected with the City's Risk Management Department.
- We connected with the Fort Wayne chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIA) on their annual fundraising event. They presented us with a donation check. It's organizations and individuals like this that make our community great. Thank you FWAIA for the donation.
- I attended the Park Foundation's annual meeting and gave an update on our summer programs and projects. The Foundation's board members had several questions which I answered. As this was their annual meeting, the meeting was open to the public and they had several people in attendance.
- Towards the end of the month, we opened the newest section of Riverfront with phase 2a between Promenade and Headwater's Parks. This new section is just north of the private development of Riverfront at Promenade. The designers blended the themes of Promenade Park while tying it into Headwaters Park.
- We held the ground-breaking ceremony for the first phase of Franke Park's Renaissance project. This is the new entrance off of Goshen Road, bridge over the Spy Run Creek, new pavilion, parking, trails, and much more. Work is underway with completion towards the end of 2024.
- We also had the ribbon cutting ceremony on the newest park of McKinnie Commons on June 28th. This new space is located at the northeast corner of Anthony and McKinnie. The space includes a bandshell, grass area, swings, plaza with seating, landscape planters, and a food truck lane. This will be on our Park & Play route in July.

Chuck Reddinger – Deputy Director, Salomon Farm Park, Community Centers (Youth/Downtown/McMillen Park), Riverfront, Athletics, Aquatics, Golf, Outdoor Recreation, Special Events, Headwaters Park, and Travel Service

Iennings Center

- The staff at Jennings took turns leading a variety of enrichment programs for the youth. Daily they would be creative in having the youth do some form of fun math, science, self-care or character-building activity. The community partners came weekly and provided the youth with a variety of fun-filled activities from art projects, to simple snacks and fitness fun as well as digging deep and talking about their inner feelings and how to deal with them.
- Some group activities that the youth loved and became staples in the daily activities were:
 - The children were able to make stress balls. They were given balloons and with a funnel, they were able to put rice into the balloon and this formed the stress ball.
 - The Staff took 24 youths to the Botanical Conservatory, and 24 youths went on the Pontoon boat rides.
 - o Ms. Woods had one of her former students come to show the youth Ballet Dance.
- On July 26th we celebrated the 75th Anniversary of the Jennings Center. At 10:00 am a press conference with Mayor T. Henry. Children presented a card to the Mayor with their thumbprints and a message about what the Jennings Center meant to them. That same evening from 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm we had the Jennings Center 75th Anniversary Celebration it was a great turnout. Everyone

enjoyed themselves with games, carriage rides, face painting, video game trailers, and food. There were more than 300 people in attendance.

• Relando Rencher started Thursday 8/3 as the new Supervisor of Jennings Center.

Weisser Park Center

- On July 19, the youth made kites and flew them and on July 27 they tie-dyed backpacks.
- On July 21, a total of 24 youth went on a pontoon boat ride.
- On July 24 and July 26th, we took 46 youth to the Memorial Park splash pad
- On July 28, we held our End of Summer Program Celebration. The youth enjoyed a day full of fun games and were served chili cheese dogs, meatballs, baked beans, potato chips, ice cream, and cake
- Zynette provided two virtual field trips. The youth enjoyed experiencing the largest aquarium in
- the United States of America, the Georgia Aquarium in Atlanta, Georgia, and the largest zoo in the
- world, The Wilds in Cumberland, Ohio.
- Parkview Healthy Seeds discussed with the youth how important sleep is and the appropriate
- amount of sleep per night. They also enjoyed a relaxing yoga exercise.
- ACPL leads are youth in an art challenge. On July 17, the youth created negative space art using cardstock, tape, and pastel markers. On July 24, the youth learned how to make different types of paper airplanes and tested to see which design flew the best.
- Purdue CATCH visited on July 18 and discussed with our youth the effects of too much screen time
- and some alternatives to watching television and computer use.
- On Saturday, July 15, Weisser collaborated with Ten Point Coalition for the 1st Annual Community
- Live Celebration held at Weisser Park. The celebration is an event to address physical, mental and
- spiritual well-being within the community.

Salomon Farm Park

- Salomon Farm Park Farmin' Fun Day Camp ran for the entire month of June with each week sold out. Salomon Farm Park Farmin' Fun Day Camp was on break from Monday, July 3, 2023, to Friday, July 7th, 2023. Camp resumed with week 5 on Monday, July 10th, 2023. The Camp was nearly full for the last two weeks of camp.
- Due to day camp, programs and rentals in the Learning Center will start back up in August. Old Barn rentals are still scheduled throughout the summer.
- A dry spring has affected the flower fields at Salomon Farm Park. Similar to last year, the weeds
 were outgrowing the sunflowers and other flowers. Staff have been working on different ways of
 controlling the weeds. The specialty flower rows such as Gomphrena, Cosmos, Statics, and more
 have not gone as planned due to a variety of reasons. This will continue to be a learning year and
 staff has discussed cutting back on a large variety of flowers and focusing on doing a select few well.
- Frankie and Mickey the Highland mini cows took a break from the Meet and Greet sessions and the kids at Farmin' Fun Day Camp were able to interact with them throughout June and July.
- All fields have been planted with flowers, this includes the front field and the west fields that are quartered by the Heritage Barn and Equipment barn. Salomon staff will be starting the sunflower U-Pick at the end of the month for the front field and then a section of the west field will follow in a couple of weeks. The department recently wrapped one of the concession trailers that use to be used for the pools. This trailer was sitting unused and will now be put to good use with a fresh new look! Staff will be selling out of the trailer this year, which will be a nice visual for patrons trying to navigate where the U-pick is located.

Franke Park Day Camp

- For June 2023 most weeks at Franke Park Day Camp were full. With additional staff added waitlists were dropped to below 10 kids in most age groups. Franke Park Day Camp was on break from Monday, July 3, 2023, to Friday, July 7th, 2023. Camp resumed with week 5 on Monday, July 10th, 2023.
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River Camp

River Camp is a one-week day camp with a on focus water activities, outdoor games, fishing, canoeing and kayaking, hiking, river clean-up, and much more. Ages are between 8 and 12 years old. This is a small camp maxing out at 40 kids. This camp is housed at Shoaff Park Riverlodge and was held on Monday, July 24th through Friday, July 28th, 2023. This year the kids enjoyed a pontoon ride on the St. Joseph River. The campers also learned canoe and kayak skills on the river throughout the week. River Camp was full with 40 kids for 2023 and 19 kids on the waitlist.

♣ Golf

- Steve McDaniel, Dave Weadock, Gary Whitacre, Bryan Keister and Jason Smith continue to meet and work with the golf course architects. The intent is to address the majority of the public concerns with the redesign of the Foster Park Golf Course.
- Gary Whitacre stated that all 3 (three) golf courses are showing a high level of sustained play and range use since the weather has been consistently warm and dry.
- Gary Whitacre commented that the Little City Golf Tournament was held at McMillen Park Golf Course. The event was a one-day tournament as opposed to two like in the past. Numerous participants commented on how nice the course looked and played.

Aquatics

- Daryn Schwartz reported that several last-minute lifeguard applications were a welcome sight. After hiring and getting the lifeguards trained, Northside and McMillen Pools were able to be open six days a week as they have in the past.
- Daryn Schwartz reported that the long-time Aquatic Supervisor had resigned. The aquatics team at both pools stepped up and took on different roles to keep the pools running for the public to enjoy.
- Jason Smith reported that the main pump at Northside Pool expired causing the pool to be shut down for a day. Thankfully as soon as the new one arrived the department MTs had it installed and running. Ensuring that the pool was open for learn-to-swim lessons and the public the next day.

Lifetime Sports Academy

- Jason Smith reported that the Lifetime Sports Academy is entering its last week of the summer. This will wrap up the 25th anniversary of the program. He also stated that along with the participant and staff shirts commemorating the anniversary, all of the various last-day contests medals had it on them as well.
- Jason Smith reported that three Lifetime Sports Academy golf participants took part in the First Tee Golf Championship at Eagle Creek Golf Course in Indianapolis. This was the first year that any participants had taken part in this event.

Iunior Golf

- Dave Scudder reported that the Junior Golf Tour wrapped up with the fun day scramble at Shoaff Golf Course. The two-day Pee Wee Golf Tour Championship will be the culmination for the younger players.
- Daryn Schwartz and Jason Smith continue to get requests for drone videos and photographs for various events and facilities. Jason Smith stated that more areas are starting to be Geo Fenced but not shown on the air maps. This can cause problems when not being allowed to fly in certain areas.

A Park and Play

- The program started on June 12 and ended on July 28. The first half of the summer was slower but once people caught onto the program the attendance grew. The locations this year were as follows:

 - Pop Up Locations were held at the following parks: Kreager (10 kids), Shoaff (40 kids), and Hamilton (5 kids)
- Adjustments will be made for next year on times and locations.

McKinnie Commons Grand Opening

• The grand opening was held on June 27th. The Mayor and several community leaders, Parks and Recreation and Community Development cut the ribbon for our newest Park. There were games, music, free pizza, snow cones, and cookies. There was an estimated attendance of 200.

Lommunity Center

- The Lego Challenge was held on July 7th from 4-6 pm at the Community Center. This was a fun event for the kids and their adults. There was a standard team challenge (where a parent partners up with a kid), a solo challenge for older youth, and the Family challenge (where kids bring in a custom project from home). We had a total of 32 participants and 324 votes, either in person or using our custom QR code. Which was a success for out-of-town families to utilize for voting purposes.
- <u>Father Daughter Dance</u> was held on June 16th from 6-8 pm. It was a wonderful turnout for the event this year. Your Party Princess came with Princess Belle to take photos and mingle with the guests. We look to bring them back in the future, carriage rides as always along with a new and improved photo booth and setup in the lobby.
- <u>Senior Games:</u> Our goal was 500 and we ended up with 529 participants. our wrap-up meeting is July 27th @ 3. We had great feedback about the banquet. The only complaint was that it lasted too long. We are working on the evaluations now. Full report next month.

Riverfront

- June rentals started with an internal event hosted by the Community Development Office of Fort Wayne with an open house to discuss the Phase II development of Riverfront at Promenade Park.
- The first Saturday of June was one of the yearly community events hosted by Fort4fitness with the Spring Cycle. The day was filled with live music as the race started and finished at Promenade Park. The next big rental was another annual community event of River Drums. This event continues to grow as they use Promenade Park to celebrate the culture and heritage of our Rivers in Fort Wayne. The Park Foundation Pavilion held 4 wedding ceremonies in June along with 2 graduation ceremonies. Corporate events include rentals from Vera Bradley, regional internship gatherings, rotary meetings, and the Swiss Re ribbon cutting for their new downtown office at the lofts at Riverfront. July rentals included 3 wedding ceremonies and 2 corporate events at the Park Foundation Pavilion. "Young at Heart" was held in partnership with 3 Rivers Festival and packed the pavilion for fun games for people over the age of 60 years old. SCAN held its annual board of directors meeting at the Park Foundation Pavilion and then held its annual SCAN Duck Race at the Park. Paul Didier of Coldwell Banker held a client/employee appreciation party and rented the entire Park for a full day of fun activities inside and outside of the Pavilion. Our biggest rental for July at Promenade was the Taylor University picnic held on the Auer Lawn and the Park Foundation Pavilion with over 300 people in attendance.
- Riverfront Programs included our annual Free Family Fishing Day at the park in junction with the Indiana DNR free fishing day.
- Our Dance Promenade concluded in June with an Ecstatic Dance Party on the Auer Lawn.
- The Riverfront River Rangers was held on every Wednesday from June to the end of July averaging at least 50 people in attendance. This free event teaches kids STEM through practical projects and fun activities at Promenade Park.
- Storytime on the Riverfront was held on every Wednesday at the Pavilion Patio in partnership with the Fort Wayne community library and continued to grow from last year with an average of 60 people in attendance each week.
- Our free Sunday events of Yoga on the Riverfront and the Sunday Heritage concert series continued to have great attendance as Yoga was moved outside to the Riverfront steps.
- Our biggest event at Promenade Park for June and July was our Muddy River Concert Series. This event continues to pack the Park every other Wednesday to enjoy live music from local bands. This year we have been able to work the Ted's Snack Bar to include a large footprint for the liquor license and were able to extend it to include the Auer Lawn. Park Patrons can buy drinks and food from the Café and have the ability to carry them throughout the Park during the show. The Muddy River Concert Series kicked off on June 7th with We Are Checkmark and was followed by the local but nationally known blues duo of Left Lane Cruiser. The Distractions and Austin Bridges completed the July shows. The crowds have increased significantly from previous shows to an average of 500 people at the Park for each concert.
- The Festival season at Headwaters Park kicked off in June starting with Arab Fest renting out the Rothschild West Pavilion from June 3rd to the 4th. Following Arab Fest was German Fest renting the Lincoln East Pavilion and the Rothschild West Pavilion from June 7th through the 11th.
- German Fest setup and tear down went smoothly and it was estimated total attendance of 45,000 people selling more beer than in previous years. Following German Fest was Rib Fest from June

- 15^{th} - 18^{th} . Vendors packed the Duck Street parking lot to sell BBQ food along with live music in the Lincoln East Pavilion each night.
- Rib fest was followed by Greek Fest from June 22nd- 25th and included live music and local food from the Fort Wayne Greek Orthodox Church.
- July rentals at Headwaters kicked off with the staple event of the Three Rivers Festival. Three Rivers went kicked off on July 7th with a live concert and finished off on July 15th with the downtown Fireworks. Each night had different live music and events. Vendors were set up on the Rothschild West Pavilion and the East Lawn was home to carnival rides. The event had very few maintenance issues and seemed to work well even with the construction of the Lofts at Headwaters intruding into the Duck Street Parking lot. Junk Food Alley was able to fit almost all vendors into the condensed space and the electrical and water hookups were able to meet the needs of each vendor.
- Pride Fest followed Three Rivers on July 21st and ended on July 22nd. The Pride Board of Director
 President stated it was their most attended event to date and had no outside issues with the public.
 The event included live music at Lincoln East Pavilion and family activities and vendors at the
 Rothschild West Pavilion.
- July concluded with the Ludacris featuring Juvenile and Chingy Concert held by Jake Slater of Electric Promotions. This event brought a large crowd for these Nationally known acts.

♣ McMillen Park Community Center

- Our Youth Summer program started June 5 and operates in two different sessions. The first session began at 9 am-12:30 and 1:30-5 pm. We average 300 kids a day with ages ranging from 5-16. Youth are divided by their age for programming. The age groups are 5yo, 6-7yo, 8-10yo, and 11 and up. Breakfast, lunch, and a snack are provided to youth in the program. FWCS is providing teachers with an enrichment hour and The Center for non-violence is also working with youth on developing behavioral and coping skills.
- In June youth were provided with the opportunity to ride the Sweet Breeze. From all accounts the experience was a pleasant one.
- In July youth participated in the Save the River Program, where kids went into the neighbors and cleaned the sewers.
- Youth also had fun going to the swimming pool which allowed them to have some fun with other kids outside of the summer program. The 5-7-year old's went Tuesday, 8-10 year old's went Wednesday, and 11 and up went Thursday. It was nice to be able to provide kids the opportunity to swim some of them hadn't been swimming all summer.
- McMillen Park Community Center partnered with Parkview to host the Ayanna Patterson Empower Forward Basketball Camp on July 28th. There were over 100 youth in attendance to work with some of the area's best basketball and skills coaches. Our summer program ends on August 9th.

- 4 Our summer programs are wrapping up. Fall registration begins August 2nd. The Front Office staff entered 162 feebased fall programs into our RecTrac registration system.
- 4 Popular fall programs include cooking classes for both kids and adults at Salomon Farm Park, Lindenwood free hikes, adult recreational volleyball and basketball, and fall craft classes.
- August will continue to be a busy month for pavilion rentals. All the enclosed pavilions are reserved every Saturday and Sunday in August. There are sporadic openings at a few open pavilions. Everyone is trying to get into one last summer party!
- The Controller's Office announced a 2024 Budget Kickoff Memo in mid-June with various instructions and due dates. The completed 2024 Budget was due July 14th.
- The 2024 Budget will be introduced to City Council in September with Council Departmental Budget meetings and Budget passage occurring in October.
- ♣ The Parks and Recreation Department paid 421 employees (132 full-time and 289 regular part-time and seasonal) for the payroll ending June 17th, 2023, and paid on June 23rd, 2023.
- We currently have the following permanent full-time positions open, posted, interviewing, or in the process of being hired, as of June 30th, 2023:

General park question phone calls always increase in the summer so the Front Office staff has spent a lot of time on the phones assisting citizens with their questions, as well as with Sweet Breeze ticket sales, Foellinger Theatre ticket sales, Summer Fun Times registrations, pavilion reservations seekers and much more!
- ☐ The second round of deadlines for the summer athletic programs is July 3rd with those programs beginning July 10th.
- ♣ Summer weather reminds everyone that they want to have summer parties which mean many calls looking to rent one of our 22 reservable pavilions. After getting through a full month of pavilion rentals in June, we are heading for

- another full month in July! All of the 22 pavilions are reserved every Saturday and Sunday in July, except for six dates, where there is only one pavilion available on each date.
- ♣ Many of the Front Office staff participated in some of the 44th Annual Senior Games events including the trivia contest, shuffleboard, corn hole, skeeball, and axe throwing contests. What a great opportunity for everyone to be able to participate in each of these events for just \$1 each! The Senior Games started on June 3rd and will run through July 6th
- We also have one Front Office staff member on the Dragon Boat team that will be racing during the 4th Annual Dragon Boat Races held on August 4th and 5th.
- ♣ The Controller's Office announced a 2024 Budget Kickoff Memo in mid-June with various instructions and due dates. The completed 2024 Budget is due July 14th. The City Controller will meet with Departments to discuss their Budgets on an "as-needed" basis in July; this may also involve some recommended budget changes.
- ♣ The 2024 Budget will be introduced to City Council in September with Council Departmental Budget meetings and Budget passage occurring in October.

🖶 Facilities Maintenance

- Pavilion rentals totaled: 406 for June. This is up from 279 in May.
- Graffiti was removed from the flowing locations; underneath the Martin Luther King Jr bridge, Hamilton Park's shelter, Lafayette Park's shelter, McCormick Park Pavilion parking lot, Klug Park's playground, Foster Park's playground, and the Lawton Park skate park.
- Franke Park's Pond pavilion received a seating upgrade. This was to replace the aging folding chairs with a style that is constant with other FWPRD rental facilities.
- Relief workers pressure-washed the ceiling and building exterior at the Foster Park Pavilion #1. Kreager Park and the Swinney Park pavilion were also cleaned.
- Mark Stafford was hired as a working leader in the facilities department.

Maintenance Technicians

- Work was completed on the summer showcase for the Botanical Conservatory. This included removing the butterfly lab from the previous showcase and then installing a Brownstone building façade that had been constructed prior.
- The lights at Foster Park's pavilion #1 were upgraded to LED.
- A concrete memorial bench pad was poured and a bench was installed at Memorial Park.
- Foellinger Theater in Franke Park received new upgrades to its concession area. This included a new cooler for drink storage and a new ice machine. The appropriate electrical and plumbing work was completed to get them operational.
- Repairs were made to secure the roof overhang post at Lakeside Park's pavilion #1 after it was damaged from a vehicle impact.
- Window screens were replaced at the Waynedale Park pavilion.
- The women's toilet, toilet paper dispensers, and soap dispensers in both restrooms at PSI-OTE Park all had to be replaced due to vandalism.
- The potable water tank for the Sweet Breeze canal boat had to be removed and repaired to fix a leak.

- Heavy equipment has been busy delivering loads of ball diamond dirt to various softball fields
- Crews delivered trash cans to various events throughout the parks.
- We have also purchased 10 new trash cans and received some from Matt Gratz.
- Heavy Equipment hauled playground mulch to McMillen and Bowser Parks.
- Large ruts at Kettler, Franklin, Northside, Tillman, Turpie, Shoaff, and Foster West were filled in and seeded to restore the turf.
- Heavy equipment has also been assisting the garage by hauling tractors and mowers to and from the golf courses.
- The garbage truck is now running every day including Sundays.
- Seasonal employees along with our parks reliefs cut back overgrown areas along the River Greenway trail system.

Lawton Garage/Operations

• 168 work orders were scheduled this month, 25 of which were services.

- The damaged crane sections from unit 98a have been repaired and are being shipped back to RPM machinery to be installed back on the forestry crane.
- Van 44 (Freightliner Sprinter) is currently being used by the Headwater Maintenance tech. We are getting quotes to install storage shelving in this van.
- Truck 66 (Ford F250) was dropped off at Ford to have the rusty bed repaired so that it can be put back into service.
- Truck 29 (Ford F450) was also transported to Ford to have the leaking oil pan repaired.
- Toro 5910 unit 519 which was at RPM machinery has been shipped to Kenney Machine in Indianapolis to see if they can diagnose the drivability issues.
- The replacement engine for Toro Unit 590 was delivered and the mechanics have removed the damaged engine and are ready to install the new one in the mower.
- A handrail under the MLK bridge was broken by vandals and the small engine mechanic is in the process of welding and repairing the damage so it can be reinstalled.
- The bow thrusters on Sweet Breeze have been problematic and mechanics have spent several days replacing parts and sorting out the issues.
- A new large electric parts washer was installed in the garage after maintenance techs installed new wiring to support the machine.
- The replacement engine for the golf ball picker cart 1149g arrived and is awaiting installation into the cart.
- New diagnostic software for the garage arrived and was added to the inventory. This software was originally slated to be part of the 2023 lease purchases but a last-minute sale allowed us to save 15% which was accomplished by using a P-card with approval from purchasing.
- Other 2023 lease purchases are now on order with several others waiting on final updated quotes.
- 2 new Club Car Carry cabs and a John Deere Gator are in stock and will ship soon with July arrival times.
- Parks is working with Fleet to locate trucks needed for both 2022 and 2023 purchases. Currently, Tom Kelley Ford in Decatur has 4 of the 5 trucks needed for 2023.
- Earlier than usual dry weather has made using the Rain Boy sprinklers at Kreager and Foster West a necessity. Due to this early use and vandalism, multiple units have needed repair and replacement parts from Bauer to keep them operating. A purchase order may be needed as costs continue to increase.

Storeroom and Property:

- Storeroom staff supplied PPE, shirts, and tools to a large number of new seasonal employees on staff in grounds and horticulture.
- Several used batteries that have been stockpiled in the storeroom were recycled at Battery's Plus freeing up shelf space.

♣ Planning Report – July 2023

- The Staff has begun meeting regularly with the Franke Park Renaissance construction team to review project
 progress and updates. Earthwork continues for the new entrance drive, while concrete pours are scheduled for
 mid-July.
- Permitting is still in progress for the Spy Run Creek Restoration portion of the project. Staff met with teachers from Amp Lab to discuss a potential project for this year's studio. We are exploring a project at Spy Run Creek in Franke Park; students may conduct water quality testing and develop public messaging about the restoration projects there.
- An early bid package has been assembled and readied for release in early July for Phase IIB of Riverfront Development. A contract is anticipated to be awarded for work planned on the north side of the floodwall east of Harrison Street, including earthwork, demolition, and utilities. We still await permits for the remainder of the project. Except for a final punch list, construction is complete for Phase IIA of Riverfront Development. This public space, located between Harrison and Calhoun Streets just south of the St. Marys River, serves as a pedestrian link between Promenade Park and Headwaters West.
- Progress continues as we move towards the completion of the Parks Comprehensive Plan. Stakeholder meetings have been scheduled for mid-July.
- We continue to work with project consultant JPR towards the completion of construction documents for Brewer Park Redevelopment. Plans include a rentable open-air pavilion, playgrounds, basketball courts, walking paths, a splash pad, and landscape improvements.
- Significant time was spent planning and executing the summer showcase, 'Herban Garden', for the Conservatory. This included prop design and contracting, coordination with artists, and project installation.
- Staff met regularly with Conservatory management to discuss various agreements, staff training, marketing, showcase, and facility operations. Progress continues to be made on the various capital projects within the facility that were discovered through the facility assessment and internal discussions.

Horticulture and Landscape Report- June 2023

- Landscape staff completed annual displays at Foster, Lakeside, Freimann, Community Center, Courthouse, Swinney Letter Bed, and Bluffton Rd. Letterboxed.
- Gardeners assisted in removing the spring Butterfly Show and installing the "An Herban Garden" exhibit during show change at the Botanical Conservatory this month.
- Landscape staff continued clean-ups throughout the parks. Clean-ups include debris and litter removal, pruning/deadheading, pre-emergent application, bed edging, and mulching. Parks in focus included Foster, Lakeside, Lawton, Headwaters, and Martin Luther King Bridge.
- Weed maintenance continued with post-emergent herbicide treatments.
- Landscape staff delivered several pots to Weisser, McMillen, and Jennings Center for the kids to use as

gardens.

- Landscape staff loaded, hauled, and dumped approximately 85 yards of mulch in REA Park. Volunteers from Lincoln Financial spent the day spreading it with the help of one of the Landscape staff on June 26th.
- Irrigation repairs were made at Main Street Medians and Foellinger Theatre.
- Pride Landcare continued moving all contracted maintenance areas.
- Lawnganics continued with turf fertilization and weed control on all park locations under contract.
- Thirty-six geese were removed and relocated by Wildlife Wranglers LLC from Lakeside Park.
- Five total Memorial Benches were installed in a variety of locations that include Memorial Park, Repka Park, Lakeside Park, Aboite Trails, and the Pufferbelly Trail.
- Interviews for the open Promenade Gardener position were completed in June. Beth Krill from the horticulture seasonal staff was hired to fill the position. Her first official day will begin in July.
- One additional seasonal staff member was hired this month. Seasonal staffing is full at this time.
- Sarah Allen, Ashley Mitchell, Joe Minick, and Beth Krill all received their Registered Technician training and credentials this month through the Indiana State Chemist Office. At this time, all full-time Horticulture staff are now licensed or certified to apply herbicides.
- Landscape staff completed Chainsaw/Chipper training this month.
- Volunteers put in 227.5 hours in the greenhouse.

♣ Riparian Management Report- June 2023

- The idle Speed zone buoy was deployed on June 8th in three locations along the Saint Marys River.
- Headwaters, Guldin, Shoaff, and Promenade docks were kept clean and maintained.
- Completed two volunteer events: one group of 10 people removed .5 tons of honeysuckle in the Brookview neighborhood and one group of 10 removed litter around Lawton and Headwaters Parks. The total was 40 volunteer hours for June. The volunteers were also given a short presentation on water quality and invasive species.
- Large woody debris was removed along the Saint Marys River totaling approximately 10 tons. Litter and man-made debris were removed from the river along Saint Marys, Saint Joseph, and Maumee total of approximately 1.5 tons.
- Continued coordination and assistance with the operation of Sweet Breeze. The boat was pulled out of the river briefly to assess the malfunctioning bow thruster. Maintenance and repair continue without interfering with the tour schedule.
- Seasonals completed chainsaw training on June 15th.

Forestry Report- June 2023

- This year's Emerald Ash Borer treatment is complete. In total, 289 trees were treated throughout the City.
- Scheduling of the 2023 Fall Tree Planting Project is well underway. So far, 418 planting sites have been selected. Most of these sites were requested through the Citizen Match Tree Planting Program. The deadline for submitting Citizen Match applications is July 1st. This fall we will be partnering with Community Development on an initiative to plant 100 street trees in the Harvester Neighborhood with the goals of reducing noise pollution, improving community health concerns, and enhancing neighborhood character.
- In June, the Forestry crews completed 155 out-of-cycle tree maintenance requests. Examples of these requests include tree limb elevation to facilitate large vehicles, removal of limbs touching homes, clearing street lighting and signage, and removal of dead limbs. We anticipate these becoming more common as the routine maintenance cycle timeframe extends.

- 46 high-priority trees were removed by in-house crews this month. We have begun our annual level 3 tree risk assessment of trees throughout Fort Wayne. So far, 13 of our 52 pruning sections have been inspected resulting in 199 high-priority candidates for removal being identified. This inspection will take most of the summer and is expected to result in more than 1,000 trees being identified as candidates for removal.
- It's common for Fort Wayne to experience storms during the summer months. On Sunday, June 25, a cold front brought with it wind gusts of more than 50 mph that resulted in considerable damage to trees throughout the City. Forestry crews responded to 66 storm-related fallen/hanging limbs and 14 total tree failures.



- Seven vehicle damage appraisals were conducted this month totaling \$5,350.00 in city tree damage.
- Forestry staff responded to and resolved 153, 311 call center tickets this month.
- The 20th annual Color in Motion: Live Butterfly Exhibit wrapped up on June 25 and made way for a Showchange into the Summer/Fall exhibit, An Herban Garden (opened July 1). The Botanical Conservatory hosted several well-received programs/events in June 2023 including Spring Plant Swap (June 3), Breakfast with Butterflies (June 4 & 11), Camp ACTIVenture (June 12 July 28), Father's Day in the Garden (June 17-18), and National Pollinators Week (June 20-24). Staff are gearing up for Daylily Show (July 8), Jazzworks! (July 15), Iris Sale (July 23), Local Food Week (July 28 August 6), and ROOTS Music Fest (August 4 & 5).
- Two Weekend/Evening Receptionists, Brandon Holt, and Lauren Heimann, have been hired and cleared. Program Facility Coordinator Education & Interpretation remains vacant and is temporarily on hold until the end of Camp ACTIVenture.

4 Botanical Conservatory Facility and Maintenance

Simply completed the installation of the fire system and will make the final adjustments in early July.

LA Electric has achieved substantial completion on the Interior Garden Lighting Project. Only two light fixtures remain to be installed and are currently on order from the manufacturer.

Terrace Garden lighting was repainted, as needed, and bulbs were replaced, as needed.

Allied Mechanical installed the new Carrier Air Compressor and any plumbing/electrical that needed to be replaced. They successfully disassembled the Dunham-Bush. Visitors should notice more comfortable temperatures in the Botanical Conservatory Showcase House and Magnolia Room.

O'Neil's Glass made replacements for Conjure Coffee windows that were fogged due to seal failures.

Southwest Honey installed the Observation Hive Display in the Tropical Linkway.

4 Botanical Conservatory Landscape and Horticulture

Staff identified Lontrel specialty herbicide as a product that could effectively reduce thistle pressure around the property. Two successful applications of Lontrel have proven it to be effective.

Pride Landcare continued its service at the Botanical Conservatory, including edging. Lawnganics has been applying organic fertilization. The turf at the Botanical Conservatory is looking greener and healthier.

Pfister Irrigation successfully repaired and replaced irrigation valves; the outdoor irrigation system is fully operational.

Botanical Conservatory and Lawton Park Gardeners/Maintenance executed successful Showchanges from Color in Motion Live Butterfly Exhibit to An Herban Garden, which will run through November 12.

Annual planting in the front landscape at the Botanical Conservatory has been completed and features millet, pentas, petunia, begonia, and coleus to add visual interest in the area around *Megaflora*.

The Earthen Berms featuring invasive Euonymus fortune have been pruned back heavily to allow for roof access and a more structured appearance to the Botanical Conservatory Calhoun Street landscape.

Gary Whitacre – Manager, Golf Operations

Golf nationally is seeing a big upswing, and the Parks courses continue to do extremely well. The weather has been very cooperative this year, with lost days to rain/wet conditions being very low. Overall, the courses year to date are showing a 32% revenue increase over last year. Here is the breakdown per course:

- ♣ Even with these promising numbers, we could still do more. The cart situation has been relatively stable this year, but still much of the season we have been down carts due to maintenance issues (especially at Shoaff Park). We are expecting delivery of 17 carts this year, but the anticipated delivery date remains October so not much difference will be made this season.
- ♣ The new carts (when they arrive) will go to Foster Park, and their remaining 2015 model-year carts will go to Shoaff. These will replace carts dating back to 2002 and will be a HUGE upgrade. As we continue to expand the cart fleet (15 more carts are scheduled for a spring 2024 delivery), we will get closer to our goal of having 50 carts at Foster, and 30 each at Shoaff and McMillen. The concern will then shift to storing those carts, especially at Shoaff. Their current fleet of 24 carts sits outside, exposed to the elements 24/7. This is certainly less than ideal, especially since the chargers are exposed also.
- ♣ The Foster Park golf course renovation master plan continues to move forward. A new rendering was received and is being analyzed by the Parks Department. The new drawing stays within the footprint of the existing golf course, but includes a new full-sized driving range and short game area as well as many improvements in playability and irrigation/drainage. We are preparing notes to share with the architects to "tweak" the new drawing before sharing it with the public.

- ♣ With the advent of August, we do lose some seasonal staff going back to school. That said, the number of seasonal employees remaining to finish out the year is good, and we still have many strong applicants that we could tap into should the need for additional help become necessary. We are doing our best to stay within the budgeted numbers for help, but this is somewhat difficult because of the high volume of play, the wage increases for the seasonal employees, and the taking on additional responsibilities by eliminating the volunteer workers at Foster Park.
- 🖶 The remainder of the year looks good, with several outings scheduled for August/September. We have consciously NOT filled up with outings to remain available to the public. There is every reason to believe the uptick in golf activity will continue, and golf activity will continue to remain strong.

- ♣ The Hanna Street Trail construction from Pettit to Decatur Road is complete.
- 🖶 The Hanna Street Trail from Decatur Road to Burns Boulevard will be bid in August. Once this section is completed in the spring of 2024, the trail will be completed from Wallace Street to Tillman Park and Southtown Centre. We will finish the final phase from Wallace to Berry in 2025.
- 🖶 The Liberty Mills Road Trail construction and the Summit Park Trail construction along Ludwig Road will commence in September or October.
- 🖶 The City submitted a \$1 million grant request to the DNR on 8/1 for the Next Level Trails program for the Illinois Road Trail from Rockhill Park to Getz Road (2 miles). Awards will be announced in December. The County applied for the Union Chapel Road Trail from west of Auburn Road to the Pufferbelly Trail.
- 🖶 We will now begin working on a grant to fund the rest of the 6-Mile Creek Trail in the City limits from the intersection of Tillman Rd/Lemar Dr to the intersection of Adams Center Rd/Seiler Rd. We are pursuing engineering, right of way, and construction funding from the U.S. DOT's Neighborhood Access & Equity program. The grant is due on 9/28. If successful, we will be able to link the Rivergreenway in Tillman Park to the Rivergreenway at Maplecrest Rd, forming a significant loop in our network and connecting neighborhoods in SE Fort Wayne to many destinations.
- ♣ Open Streets will be held on August 20th from Noon 4 p.m. We have over 100 activity providers who will be stationed along a 2-mile stretch of Calhoun Street from The Landing to Pontiac Street. We close down Calhoun to vehicular traffic and let people on foot or bike take over the street for 4 hours. We have this event to celebrate our commitment to active transportation and to provide a terrific community engagement opportunity with local businesses, non-profits, and City and County services/programs. Visit https://www.cityoffortwayne.org/openstreets.html to learn more. We have a 3-minute video that gives you a taste of what Open Streets looks like.

- → The City is updating the *Bike Fort Wayne* and *Walk Fort Wayne* Plans and creating one Active Transportation

 Document. In June, we collected 1,218 responses to an Active Transportation survey. We are currently analyzing the responses to help guide our plan.
- ♣ The City will be hosting the DNR's Trails Advisory Board on September 7th. We'll showcase the horse trails under construction; Promenade Park; the Urban Trail; Riverfront Phase 2; water trails; and then they'll have their quarterly meeting at Promenade Park at 3 p.m. I will also be providing a presentation on the proposed 81-mile Poka-Bache Connector from Pokagon State Park to Ouabache State Park.

Salomon Farm Park U-pick Flowers

U-Pick flower fields are available beginning Saturday, July 29, and continuing on Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays while flowers are blooming. Prices vary per type; \$2 per sunflower and \$1 per other stem. The front field closest to Dupont Road will open first. One of my favorite projects is underway as we recently broke ground on phase one of the Franke Park Renaissance Master Plan.. The groundbreaking follows five years of planning and fundraising with an Advisory Group of major park stakeholders and robust public input.

Phase one will include the following highlights:

- -New winding, tree-lined entrance from Goshen Road
- -New bridge over Spy Run Creek
- -New enclosed, state-of-the-art, rentable pavilion with a capacity for 400 people with parking
- -Paved multi-use trail, thoughtful vehicular circulation, and connection to residential neighborhoods in the SW corner of the park
- -Improvements to the mountain bike and hiking trails

It's great that we're able to begin work on this vital effort. Residents and visitors will be able to have a lasting and meaningful experience at our largest park as we build a world-class enhancement for the public to enjoy. One of the things that makes Fort Wayne a city like no other is our Parks and Recreation Department.

Coinciding with the Franke Park Renaissance will be the continuation (phase two) of the Spy Run Creek Streambank Restoration with design and construction support from the INDR and funding support from the Great Lakes Commission through their Great Lakes Sediment and Nutrient Reduction Program, provided by the U.S.

Department of Agriculture—Natural Resources Conservation Service under the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative.

Phase one of the Franke Park Renaissance Master Plan is expected to be complete by the end of 2024. Have a great week, Mayor Henry
