Mission

Our mission is to enhance the quality of life in Fort Wayne by providing positive opportunities for leisure time and by being stewards of our parklands, facilities, public trees and other resources entrusted to our care.

What We Do

The Parks and Recreation Department maintains over 2,840 acres of park land in 89 individual parks and currently manages 22 pavilions, 20 shelters, five recreation centers, four day camp facilities, three aquatic centers, 10 splash pads, three golf courses, two driving ranges, five disc golf courses, two dog parks, a botanical conservatory, an outdoor theatre, a zoo and a greenhouse.

Additional recreational sites include 58 playgrounds, 45 basketball courts, 50 tennis courts, 42 pickleball courts, 38 ball diamonds, 20 soccer fields, two futsal courts, eight multipurpose athletic fields, eight boat launch sites, 48 miles of trails which include Rivergreenway, park paths and mountain bikes trails, 14 ponds and lakes, a campground, a nature preserve, a BMX track, historic facilities and monuments and a 1930s era working farm.

Along with hundreds of activities and program opportunities, the Parks and Recreation Department provides free or low-cost special events for citizens of our community.





Headwaters Transitions to Parks

After 30 years of direction under The Headwaters Park Commission (in 1993) and the Headwaters Park Alliance (beginning in 2001), Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation assumed management and day-to-day operations of Headwaters Park prior to the 2023 festival season. The transition was smooth and led to a successful operation, including the seasonal Ice Rink.

New Park & Play Program Brings Fun to Youth

This mobile recreation unit called Park & Play brings a selection of sports, games, arts and crafts, fitness, nature and outdoor educational activities to youth ages five and above throughout the summer. This program supplements other summer activities for youth in neighborhood parks.



Dragon Boat Races at Promenade Park

The Fort Wayne Dragon Boat Races mixed culture and competition in a two-day family-friendly event at Riverfront Fort Wayne's Promenade Park. Since its debut in 2015, the races welcome people of all backgrounds to the river where the city of Fort Wayne was founded. The opening ceremonies featured colorful, live performances by the Chinese Friends & Family Association, live music, lighting of dramatic Floating Fire Pits and Fire Dancers. The following day, the dragon was awakened and the Dragon Boat Races commenced. In 2023, a focus on Chinese culture was expanded.





Department Aquires and Renews Parkland in Southeast Quadrant

- 75th Anniversary of the Jennings Recreational Center.
- Grand Opening of McKinnie Commons and holiday lighting.

Salomon Farm Expands Merchandising, Maintains Historic Sites

- Salomon Farm welcomed two Highland Miniature steers to the popular farm. An initial offering of eight interactive Meet and Greet sessions for the public to purchase sold- out within one hour. A total of 72 sessions were offered and completed in 2023 with all sessions selling out.
- The U-Pick Flower operation increased revenue for a total of \$14,660. This is a 70% increase over 2022.
- Two Dinner in the Flower Fields events drew 96 guests for romantic lighting, blooming sunflowers, a rustic table setting with a catered meal and live music.
- Renovations to the farm homestead and winterization of restrooms will allow for more accommodations at the park for year-round use and events.

Increased Concerts by 29% in 2023

The Theatre season showcased a diverse range of shows to 23,000 plus music fans at ticketed events and offered free Community Concerts to enthusiastic friends.

Received Generous Award from The Foellinger Foundation

Funds in the amount of \$500,000 will go a long way to upgrade the Theatre lighting, electrical improvements and structural maintenance. A portion will also help to expand merchandise and beverage service areas to improve the customer experience.





Ground is Broken on Franke Park Renaissance Project

Phase One: Grounds Maintenance Heavy Equipment crews were located in a maintenance facility in Franke Park. Those buildings and site where they are working are being demolished as part of the project. Therefore, our heavy equipment crews had to be relocated to Lawton Park until we can find a new home for them.

Parks Grew by Three in 2023

The Southeast Strategy initiatives by the City's Community Development Division and other leaders bloomed into two new parks in SE Fort Wayne:

- Powell Park at Pontiac and Weisser Park Avenue
- McKinnie Commons at McKinnie Ave. & S. Anthony Blvd.

The Maplewood Park Neighborhood Association and FWPR teamed up to develop green space into a park with a playground with slides, swings and spinning elements, plus benches and sidewalk.

• Sheldon Park at 7011 Sheldon Drive

Parks crews maintain these new parks as a part of 89 in our system.

Headwaters Park Management Shifts to Parks

Successfully transitioned Headwaters Park management from the Headwaters Park Alliance to the Parks Department. Hired a new maintenance supervisor who handles issues at Headwaters and Promenade Park. Collaborated with the Lawton Park crew and the new Riverfront maintenance crews to install the Ice Rink

Awarded Funds for New Playgrounds in Ten Parks

A larger than usual allocation from the State of Indiana from local income tax gifted Parks with \$2 million in funds specified by the City and City-Council for neighborhood park playgrounds in ten Fort Wayne Parks. Planning is complete and installation is proceeding.

Volunteer Hours Increased by 900% in 2023

By spreading mulch at park playgrounds and removing invasive plants to allow native species to thrive, volunteers contributed time and muscle to show their appreciation for Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation. Volunteer hours have grown as Covid-19 is further in the past. Volunteers donated a total of 6,863 hours in 2023.



Planning & Development

Completed 5-Year Master Plan

The 5-Year Master Plan takes a snapshot of community needs and desires, and allows FWPR to apply for various state funds through the Indiana DNR. The process inventory and analysis of the department was completed, and community input was gathered via in-person meetings and online surveys by project consultant Designing Local. The plan has been submitted and accepted by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

Lawton Greenhouse Beautified City

In 2023, the Lawton Park Greenhouse staff and volunteers grew a total of 110,503 plants, bulbs and seeds. Floral displays throughout Fort Wayne featured 29,320 plants of 284 different varieties and over 25,000 bulbs planted in the parks.

Botanical Conservatory Showcase Plant Production

- Winter Show: 1,260 pots and 3,285 pots of bulbs.
- Butterfly Show: 1,410 pots of annual flowers and vines.
- Summer Show: 1,951 including mums for the fall display.
- Holiday Show: 3,362 pots.

Approximately 1,900 plants were also produced for Conservatory events and programs.

The Great Tree Canopy Comeback Progressed

This annual volunteer effort through partnership with Friends of the Parks, was successful. It focused on the maintenance of young trees, the removal of invasive Honeysuckle in our parks and tree planting. Fifty shade trees were planted at Rockhill Park. Volunteers also removed Honeysuckle in Headwaters Park along the St. Marys River.

Work Barge Cleared Downtown Rivers

Riparian efforts removed over 162 tons of logs and navigational hazards from the downtown rivers. The cumulative effect is still apparent as the barge is now used for removing new log jams and navigational hazards caused from rain events. Bridges have been kept clear all year. More than 5,000 pounds of debris and litter was removed.



An additional \$500,000 allocation from the Mayor's office in 2023 allowed for the planting of 1069 street trees and 195 park trees. Tree planting is one of the few infrastructure investments that grows with age. We look forward to watching these trees contribute to our community's well-being.










