Steve McDaniel, Director

- ♣ The Franke Park Renaissance Project is moving forward. This month, the bidding process is open. Bids are due back for several packages near the end of the month. We hope to seek approvals in March for a beginning construction schedule this spring.
- We continue to move forward with the transition of Headwaters Park into our operations. April 1st is our first day. We also continue to work with the developer of the property to the south as it relates to access on Barr and Duck Streets to the park. Several festivals have reached out to us for plans as they develop their operations for the season.
- ♣ The team is working on a trail questionnaire for Foster Park concerning the golf course master plan. We hope to launch this very soon.
- Rob Hines and I met with a representative of the Community Foundation to discuss Planned Giving. This is something that we are working on this year to help increase awareness as people plan for the future.
- ♣ Staff members have started working on documents related to our Comprehensive Plan. We will be developing several stakeholder groups to be part of the public input portion of the plan. We will also be developing an Advisory Committee to help guide the process.
- ♣ Staff and I have been meeting with Resultant our city IT consultants. Our focus this month is on replacing older classroom PCs at all of our community and youth centers. We also discuss moving forward with creating a Parks Mobil App. We are currently determining the software, licenses, and features we want to use for the app.
- In January we dealt with one significant weather event and several minor ones. Crews did a great job of keeping our drives, parking lots, sidewalks, and trails cleared during the snow events.
- ♣ Our program of Winterval was a big success. January 28th was filled with a lot of activities throughout the city that our community participated in. Thank you all for coming out and enjoying everything we had to offer.
- ♣ Staff and I held an orientation for our new Park Board member Jenna Jauch. It was a crash course to bring her up to speed with many things going on in parks and recreation.
- ♣ Several staff members attended the Downtown Improvement District's celebration. The DID honored several members of our community for all that they do to keep our downtown thriving. Our own Kelly Hatfield was one of those honored. Congratulations Kelly!
- Rob and I met with Megan McClennan of Fort Wayne Trails to discuss several projects that impact the Rivergreenway. It is our goal to build better relations with partnering groups.
- I met with Mike Connolly of REA Magnet Wire to discuss neighborhood improvements in the Harvester Neighborhood and how REA Magnet might be able to help.
- → The bonds for Franke Park Renaissance Project were sold. We had 10 bidders with the lowest bidding at 2.9% interest. This was my first experience selling bonds. According to the Controller's Office, it was twice as many bidders as they were expecting with the interest rate well below what they thought it would come in at.
- → The team and I met with Geoff Paddock to discuss future capital improvements at Headwaters Park. We came up with a priority listing of how best we should move forward. Geoff confirmed that he would take this listing to the next Headwater's Alliance board meeting.
- ♣ Chuck and I met with Loren and Liz Thomas about the property on Gump Road. It was good to catch up with both of them and discuss any issues.
- We held the December Board of Park Commissioners meeting on the 8th. Besides the business at hand, we thanked President Bill Zielke for his 17 years of service to the department and the board.
- → The Park Foundation has committed to funding \$35K towards the update to the Comprehensive Plan. This was done at their December board meeting. I also gave a project update along with updating them on other issues within the department.

- ↓ I was sworn in as President of the Board for 2023 for the Indiana Parks and Recreation Association. This is the second year of a three-year commitment to the board.
- We celebrated the 69th year of the Wassail at the Jennings Center earlier in the month. We also had several celebrations of the holidays at multiple locations throughout the park system.
- ♣ I hope that we have a very prosperous 2023 Year. I am looking forward to what is coming this year.

4 General

- Seasonal wages were finalized for the 2023 season. With the limited number of staff applications, it was decided to increase starting wages from \$10-\$11/hr. to a new starting rate of \$13-\$15/hr. Many program fees will be adjusted to help cover these increases.
- Seasonal jobs have been getting posted to the City of Fort Wayne's Human Resources page.

💺 Salomon Farm Park

- Six Learning Center rentals were booked in December 2022 compared to four in December 2021. Salomon Farm Park has seen a steady increase in Learning Center rentals from 2021 to 2022.
- Christmas on the Farm at Salomon Farm Park was held on Saturday, December 3, 2022, from 1:00 pm 5:00 pm. The weather was great for Christmas on the Farm. It was mainly sunny and 36 degrees, making it the perfect combination for patrons to get into the holiday spirit. Activities included: make your bird feeder, farm scavenger hunt bingo, letters to Santa, visit with Santa, live Christmas music, horse-drawn wagon rides, concessions, Christmas tree sales, holiday vendors selling their handmade homemade items, and the Homestead was open for people to walk through. This year Salomon Farm collected \$2,135.00 for Christmas on the Farm for 427 cars. In 2021 Salomon collected \$1,745.00 with 349 cars entering the event. Attendance was 1377 compared to 1047 in December 2021.
- Summit City Music Theatre's, A Christmas Carol shows started on December 1, 2022, at 7:30 pm and ended on December 11, 2022, at 7:30 pm. Eight shows were initially offered, with the option of adding shows if the eight existing were to sell out. Once show dates were released and tickets became available in late September, it did not take long for each show to sell out. By November 17th, 2022 three shows were sold out. Each show date had 110 seats/tickets available. Soon two more shows were added, a Sunday evening show and a Saturday matinee. All ten shows sold out at 110 tickets. Tickets were \$25.00 per seat. An indirect heating unit was rented by Salomon Farm Park to blow heat into the Old Barn. The barn is so drafty that this only helped increase the temperature by 10 degrees. Since the performances were in early December the weather did not get too cold for most

patrons. This event needed to be promoted as a dress warm event due to no heat in the Old Barn. Patron's feedback was extremely positive despite some chilly windy days. Without stadium seating in the Old Barn, it was difficult for some patrons to see everything, this was the largest complaint. The actors did a fabulous job and patrons received the message to bundle up and stay cozy for this new family tradition at Salomon Farm Park. Salomon Farm Park Staff has begun planning with Summit City Music Theatre for A Christmas Carol which will be offered again in December 2023.

- Winter Solstice walk and the ride was held at Salomon Farm Park on Wednesday,
 December 21, 2022, from 4:30 pm 8:00 pm. This event is in partnership with Fort
 Wayne Trails and Fort Wayne Public Works Greenways & Trails. Patrons could either
 participate in a walk around the Salomon loop or a bike ride on the Pufferbelly Trail.
 Upon return, they enjoyed free hot dogs grilled by Trek Bicycles and free hot chocolate
 provided by Salomon Farm Park. Salomon Farm Park also provided a bonfire and historic
 narration by Debby Bonbrake, who is a history docent for the Sweet Breeze Canal Boat.
- Salomon Farm Park is welcoming a new chef that will be teaching baking classes in the Wolf Family Learning Center. Jessica Waggoner, owner of The Hazelnut Baking Company will have baking classes advertised in the spring Fun Times. Jessica is a lifelong Fort Wayne native with degrees in both pastry art and psychology. After spending the last 10 years in the corporate world, she stepped away to focus solely on baking. She loves how food connects cultures and communities, and the joy good quality baked goods bring to people. In spring 2023 she will be offering five classes focusing on baking bread: Intro to bread baking, working with yeast, demystifying sourdough, enriched doughs: brioche and cinnamon rolls, and finally quick bread.

Lindenwood Nature Preserve

• Lindenwood Nature Preserve hosted a hike and bonfire social to celebrate the Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation annual Winterval event. This event was held on Saturday, January 28, 2023, from 9:00 am – 11:00 am. This was a free event. 56 people attended the hike and enjoyed the bonfire. Staff served free hot chocolate over the fire, which was new this year. The Winterval pre-carved ice sculpture showed up around 10:15 am. This year's sculpture was a mushroom.

4 Golf

- Dave Weadock is in the process of formulating a public survey to further gather input for the Foster Golf Course master plan. A group of citizens voiced their concerns about the possible rerouting of a section of the River Greenway that goes around the golf course. Steve McDaniel stated that this is an additional step in the process that will ensure that everyone has a chance to be heard on the project.
- Gary Whitacre is in the process of stocking the pro shops at all three golf courses with opening day set for mid-March, weather dependent.
- Bryan Keister reported that he and Travis Whitman have been repairing golf maintenance equipment and continue to get prepared for the season opener.

Riverfront

- Programs and Events at Promenade Park in December slowed down as fewer people tend
 to get outside for events. On December 8th we held the first "For Real For Real Comedy
 Stories" at the Pavilion in partnership with the local Fort Wayne MMJ Comedy group. The
 first event kicked off well with a crowd of 26 people. This event will continue through
 January and February showcasing local Fort Wayne comedians.
- Yoga on the Riverfront and the Sunday Heritage Concert Series remained steady with attendance on December 11th with the American Legion Christmas Show.
- Chess and Chill was a new event with our local chess organization moving inside the pavilion and holding a local chess tournament. Everyone that attended the event enjoyed the natural light of the pavilion and hopes to do future partnered events at this location.
- On December 22nd we held our first Christmas Movie in the Park with the Movie "Arthur Christmas". The impending winter storm seemed to halt ticket sales for the day off but we went ahead with the event with an attendance of close to 30. Everyone enjoyed the Christmas snacks and popcorn at the event. We hope to continue this event next year with the hope of better weather and attendance!
- Dance Promenade kicked off January events with the Waltz on January 4th! Following the Waltz class was the foxtrot and the Hustle. Due to the winter weather storm, we had to cancel the Dance Promenade Swing class on January 25th. Yoga on the Riverfront continued inside the Park Foundation Pavilion with another strong showing of almost 50 attendees. The Sunday Heritage Concert series had a new performer for the first show of 2023 featured Quincy Sanders. Mr. Sanders told stories of songwriting and inspiration between each song in which he played smooth jazz riffs on his saxophone. January programming finished strong with our Winter Cozy event on January 28th which finished off the Parks Department Winterval event! The night was filled with campfires and smores along with ice carvings on the patio, live music, food, and drinks provided by Mad Anthony's inside the Park Foundation Pavilion. Everyone seemed to enjoy all aspects of the event from inside to outside activities.
- Throughout October, November, and into December, we held an online auction for five bottle cap murals to be open for bid starting October 1st and ending on November 30th on RiverfrontFW.org/mural-auction. Each mural was designed by Sammie Vance, founder of Sammie's Buddy Bench Project, and created into 4-foot-tall and 5-foot-wide murals completely made out of recycled bottle caps. All five murals were assembled by community members through a Riverfront program called Caps for a Cause. Two murals were featured on BYU tv's Operation Awesome in 2020. All five murals were recently featured on Disney Parks Magical Christmas Day Parade, which aired on ABC Freeform, Hulu, and Disney+. Each mural sold for \$100 or more, with the highest bid at \$400. In total, the bottle cap mural raised \$810 to be donated to Riverfront Fort Wayne to be used towards inclusion programs. Two out of the five winning bidders requested their mural be donated to a Fort Wayne local organization. Three of the five murals will be publicly

- displayed at the Boys and Girls Club of Fort Wayne, Erin's House for Grieving Children, and PQC Works.
- The transition to the operational management of Headwaters has been progressing well. The new full-time positions have been posted for the Operations Supervisor, program coordinators, and facility support. Riverfront staff has been communicating regularly with festivals and other rental groups. The transition team is also reviewing the current daily operations and will be meeting with the current Headwaters staff soon.

Community Youth Centers (Jennings and Weisser Youth Centers)

- Weisser Park Youth Center and Jennings Recreation Center combined programming this
 month due to staff shortages. Jennings transported (walker) youth from Jennings to
 Weisser and back to Jennings after programming daily. Youths whose parents dropped
 them off at Jennings were instructed to drop them off at Weisser Park. All youth who
 attend Jennings still have the opportunity to participate in our after-school programming.
- Dmitri Golson resigned from his position at Weisser Youth Center to take a position outside the organization.
- On December 4th, Jennings Recreation Center held the 69th Annual Wassail program. The Theme for this year was "Bring Back the Memories". It was an awesome program and there were over 80 people who participated.
- On December 14th was the Toys 4 Tots Holiday party. Food was catered in by Big Lacy' Catering. The youth had a blast playing games and receiving gifts from Toys 4 Tots, Ten Point Coalition, and Erin's House.
- On Thursday, January 12th, The Community Youth Centers held their 1st Annual Family and Friends Trivia Game Night at Weisser Park. The night consisted of trivia and karaoke along with an impromptu dance party at the end. 21 of our 32 families participated, making our total attendance 103. The Ten Point Coalition volunteered and also enjoyed participating in the activities.

Community Center

- The Key Club from New Tech Academy students will be hosting the iPhone and iPad classes in January and February at the Community Center. The response was good for the 20-minute sessions.
- Community Center Downtown will be getting all new upgraded computers installed by April 1st so that classes can be taught in Windows 11.
- Josh Ogle was Hired as the Supervisor of Community Outreach, Volunteers, and Older Adults at the Community Center in December.
- Suzan Moriarty is completing her Master's in Public Health. Patti is her Mentor for the
 project. The sensory room program and educational programming will be designed to
 help older adults with dementia and individuals with autism spectrum disorder (ASD).
 The room intends to promote calmness, stimulate positiveness, and emotional well-being,
 improved socialization, and increased focus. All five senses will be targeted to create
 sensory stimulation therapy. Sensory bins will also be provided to stimulate STEM
 learning. This will offer different ways to engage all five senses while improving daily

functioning and cognitive awareness. This project serves to attract an underserved population within Fort Wayne and the surrounding counties that would not have access to this tool otherwise.

McMillen Park Community Center

- In December, the number of youth participants in programming decreased due to the holidays and averaged 20 youth a day. The STEAM program was focused on E-Sports.
- At the Annual Holiday Celebration toys were provided to the youth in our After-School program by Toys for Tots. We had over 40 children in attendance that day and they were all excited about all of the amazing gifts that they received. The children got a variety of gifts such as; speakers, earbuds, remote control cars, hair gadgets, dolls, and games.
- Also, in December youth did a variety of activities, such as baking holiday cookies, and making ornaments and holiday cards for their family members.
- Adult programming saw a decrease in participation due to the holidays. Essential Steps and Cardio Fit continued to be offered to improve the physical and mental health of the community. These programs are averaging 43 participants a session. They continue to offer Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays.
- The new Yoga program offered to adults and Seniors on Wednesdays is developing and sparking more interest. This program has a 64% increase in participation in January.
- The MPCC has been introduced to a new sport called Sepak takraw, or Sepaktakraw, also called kick volleyball. This is a team sport played with a ball made of rattan or synthetic plastic between two teams of two to four players on a court resembling a badminton court. This sport is primarily played by Burmese in Fort Wayne. It has increased our participation with the Burmese 100%.

<u>Sandra Odisho, CPA – Manager, Finance</u>

- The Parks and Recreation Department paid 163 employees (129 full-time and 34 regular part-time and seasonal) for the payroll ending January 28th, 2023, and paid on February 3rd, 2023.
- We currently have the following permanent full-time positions either open, posted, interview process, or in the process of being hired, as of January 31st, 2023:
 - o Landscape and Horticulture Gardener (Fund 121) Two Positions
 - o Project Management Technician (Fund 121)
 - o Recreation Center Coordinator Jennings (Fund 121) Two Positions

- ₩ we verified that the full-time employees all received their 5% COLA increase for 2023, as passed by City Council.
- We processed the seasonal wage changes and the part-time wage changes for 2023, as recommended by the Director and Deputy Directors.
- ♣ We processed the 2022 Tool Allowance to eligible employees on the first payroll of January 2023.
- We are working on getting several position approvals for the takeover of Headwaters Park also. As those approvals are received we will post those positions on the City HR website.

- We have been posting numerous Park seasonal positions for hire on the City HR website.
- The Front Office staff has processed 161 Dog Park Memberships so far in January, which is about 20% of the total typically sold in a year.
- They also processed 123 campground reservations in January. The main office processes reservations for the Johnny Appleseed Campground from January 1st April 30th until the campground hosts move in for the season and start handling the reservations.
- The Front Office Staff has also entered all of the Spring Fun Times programs into our RecTrac software to prepare for registration which begins February 1st. 151 programs are being offered this Spring!
- ♣ Beginning November 1st, we went from managing 21 pavilions down to the following eight:
- Sears, Franke #1, Pond, Lakeside #1, Hefner, Riverlodge, and Psi Ote Lower and Upper are available year-round as they are enclosed and heated.
- The eight pavilions that we reserve in the winter are completely booked up through January 31, 2023, on all Saturdays and most Sundays.
- We have entered 50 purchase orders in January 2023 so far, which is about 25% of the total purchase orders typically done in a year.
- The 2022 Business year in Munis was closed on January 27th, 2023. We made several journal entries at year-end to make necessary corrections and to move expenses between funds. These will be reflected in the PV Ledger as Journal 2B and 2C on page 10 of the December 2022 PV Ledger.
- We moved the Foellinger Theatre Operations that were previously handled in the Trust Fund 422 to the Non-reverting Operating Fund 439 and Non-reverting Capital Fund 428, per the recommendation of the City Controller. We updated the accounting structure in Munis, RecTrac, and Access for this change.
- We set up the accounting structure in Munis, RecTrac, and Access for the takeover of Headwaters Park and we will be using the Non-reverting Operating Fund 439 and Non-reverting Capital Fund 428 to process those new operations, per the recommendation of the City Controller.
- ♣ The Parks and Recreation Department paid 170 employees (130 full-time and 40 regular part-time and seasonal) for the payroll ending December 31, 2022, and paid on January 6, 2023.
- ♣ We currently have the following permanent full-time positions either open, posted, interview process, or in the process of being hired, as of December 31, 2022:

- ♣ The eight pavilions that we reserve in the winter are completely booked up through December 31, 2022, on Saturdays and Sundays.
- **♣** We sold many gift certificates for holiday gifts.
- ♣ We sold many golf memberships to those wanting to purchase theirs before the price increase effective January 1, 2023.
- ♣ The Winter Fun Times registration began on November 2, 2022. December through February programs are covered in this brochure. We are currently wrapping up registration for those programs in the Winter Fun Times

- ♣ The Spring Fun Times registration will begin on February 1, 2023. March through May programs will be covered in this brochure.
- ♣ We are very busy with year-end accounting procedures for the Controller's Office.
- ♣ We boxed up files for storage preparing space for the new 2023 files.

Facilities Management

- Pavilion rentals totaled: **98** for January. This is down from **161** in December.
- Graffiti was removed from the flowing locations; underneath the Martin Luther King Jr. Bridge, Theime Drive river lookout, McCormick Park splash pad, Foster Park river greenway wall, Promenade Park's playground restroom building, and Lakeside Park's pavilion #1 restroom.
- Annual cleans were completed at Weisser Park Youth Center, Community Center, and Jennings Youth Center.
- McMillen Park Community Center's basement carpet was removed by relief workers due to flooding.
- Annual cleans at the year-round facilities continued through January.
- New electronic locks were installed at both Johnny Appleseed's Camp Canine and Foster Park West's Pawster Park dog parks.
- A broken water line at the REA building caused flooding that had to be pumped out and was repaired by contractors.
- Work wrapped up on the new office conversions at the Lawton Park maintenance office building.
- The smoke detectors at the Swinney Park Homestead were upgraded.
- All receptacle outlets were replaced in the Northside Park PSI-OTE Lower pavilion.
- Locks were changed at the Promenade Park pavilion to prepare for the new tenant
- A water line froze and broke at the Repka Park restroom. Repairs were made to the water line and the walls were insulated to prevent future issues.
- Work began to pump water out of the Shoaff Lake at Franke Park. Water needs to be drained to expose the overflow culvert to verify if it is blocked which would lead to a high-water level.

- The Fire inspector took a tour of the Lawton facility.

- Receiving prices for new fountains at Reservoir park.
- VFP moved a pull station and horn strobe at Promenade Park tenant space.
- VFP connected the hood system to the fire alarm panel at the Community center.

🖶 <u>Grounds Maintenance</u>

- January is the start of the ground's winter work schedule after completely transitioning from summer and fall tasks. Crews spent the last 2 weeks of December and the first 2 weeks of January picking up limbs and pruning trees in the parks. Travis has acquired 2 more Kombi units and attachments for the crews to continue this program throughout the winter, weather permitting
- The winter maintenance crew at Kreager Park got started on mower repairs for the season. They are working closely with the storeroom and Lawton Park mechanics to ensure that maintenance records for each piece of equipment are updated and all parts and labor are assigned to the correct mower to be tracked within our maintenance software. We have a few mowers that will go to RPM Machinery for them to fix off-site.
- We have had two snow events this January, one on Sunday, January 22nd, and the other major storm on January 25th which brought a total of 6 inches. Being my first two snow events as a supervisor, I am very pleased with how the crew works together and communicates. There are a lot of moving parts and places to take care of and we will continue to make improvements in that area. The garage and its staff were very helpful in keeping the equipment up and running.
- Heavy Equipment is still moving things from Franke into Lawton. They received their new lowboy trailer and
 have been getting that ready for usage. We have addressed a sinkhole at Kettler Park and has been passed onto
 the city. We have been lowering the pond at Franke in hopes of digging up and replacing a section of pipe that
 has been compromised. Once fixed the pond should drain in a timelier manner.
- The River Greenway experienced minor flooding in January. Crews have periodically checked for downed limbs and other debris blocking the paths to ensure they remain open for users. I would anticipate some flooding in February with the amount of snow we received in January.

Planning Report – January 2023

- Franke Park Renaissance: Phase I continues to move forward; bid documents are being prepared by the design team with bidding anticipated for February. Areas for tree removal were surveyed and staked onsite, with bids being accepted through early February for this work. Tree clearing will be completed before April 1 to meet IDNR requirements for the protection of the Indiana brown bat.
- Riverfront Development: Phase IIB planning and design continues- permit applications were submitted along with 50% drawings. These drawings were reviewed and comments were shared with the design team. Coordination with various departments and agencies continues. 90% of construction drawings are scheduled for completion on March 3.

- Similar to Franke, trees need to be removed in preparation for the construction of Riverfront Phase IIB. Staff worked with the design team to identify and mark trees for removal in the field in anticipation of removal before April 1.
- The draft IDNR 5-year Master Plan was submitted to IDNR for review. Our consultants continue to refine the plan, graphics, and GIS maps; completion of the final plan is anticipated in April.
- The Parks 10-year Comprehensive Plan kick-off meeting was held in January with the project team led by Design Workshop. The advisory team is scheduled to meet again in February; we will begin to identify stakeholders and further define the project vision before beginning community outreach.
- Construction has begun on the St. Marys Streambank Stabilization: Phase II project. Stanger Group mobilized, prepared/protected the site, and has begun selective demolition of the site. Bank stabilization work will begin in early February.
- Staff met with ERI to discuss current and future project needs for the East Central Marina. The next steps will be to involve other city departments and public safety in determining potential complementary needs to be incorporated into the design.
- The Staff took part in a discussion with several other departments in making recommendations for the Downtown Design Manual revision. In particular, green infrastructure practices, requirements, and recommendations were discussed.
- Concepts for screens to be installed around the firepits at Promenade Park were completed. One cost estimate was received; we anticipate additional estimates and potential fabrication/installation in February.
- Staff continues to plan for the transition of Headwaters Park maintenance and management to be passed to the Parks Department from Headwaters Alliance. Staffing, equipment, and operations continue to be sorted out.
- The Moody Park Master Plan was completed and reviewed with the plan steering committee. We plan to post the plan to our website for public comment throughout February, with a presentation of the final plan anticipated for Park Board adoption in March.
- Staff met regularly with Conservatory management to discuss various agreements, staff training, marketing, showcase, and facility operations. Progress continues to be made on the various capital projects within the facility that were discovered through the facility assessment and internal discussions.

Horticulture and Landscape Report- January 2023

- The Winter showcase was installed at the Botanical Conservatory following the removal of the Holiday show. This year's theme is "California Dreamin".
- Gardeners continued landscape bed cleanups at Promenade Park, Lakeside Park, the Foellinger Theatre, Northside Pool, and Salomon Park.
- Pruning has been done at Lakeside Park, Lawton Park, and Northside Pool.
- Landscape staff cleared mud off the docks after a large flood event at Promenade Park.
- Landscape staff assisted in snow removal at Lawton Park, Promenade Park, Lakeside Park, and Foster Park during our last snow event.
- Cleanup, organization, and equipment maintenance began in the Landscape-Horticulture shop.
- Landscape staff continues to assist in the greenhouse as the weather dictates.
- Seven landscape staff members were trained to do greenhouse seeding. They are now scheduled in the greenhouse at certain times weekly to work on seeding trays.
- One landscape staff member was signed up for online training that will prepare them for taking their test for an herbicide license this season.
- Austin Barton was hired for the Working Leader Position. His first day began on January 9th.

- The School Children's Flower and Vegetable Association Chairperson meetings were held at the Botanical Conservatory to hand out the 2023 Booklets and prepare for seed, ribbon, t-shirt, and pencil orders.
- There were 29,486 seeds sown in the greenhouse for parks, SCFVA, Conservatory Showcase, and Mother's Day Plant Sale.
- Volunteers worked 244.5 hours in the greenhouse.

♣ Riparian Management Report- January 2023

- Collaborated on updating the seasonal job description to include the word 'river' to widen the net for the Riparian department's applicants.
- Assisted with the January showchange by providing possible woody debris for display.
- Removed 311 reported debris (tires and litter) that was accessible by land at Lawton and Swinney Park.
- Began the removal process of large, woody debris that is accessible on land while the river levels are down. Cut large debris into sections for easier removal later in the season along the St Marys River.
- Continuing recruitment and coordination with organizations for future volunteer clean-ups.
- Continuing to actively recruit seasonal workers by contacting organizations and teachers/students.
- Coordinating with the garage to strengthen the strong arm system used at Headwaters dock for improved safety.
- Began coordinating the maintenance list for future Sweet Breeze spring commissioning, improving the onboard maintenance records for Sweet Breeze, and assisting with the future training material for the crew on Sweet Breeze.
- Attended Virtual 2023 Purdue Pest Conference for Indiana Pesticide Certification for continuing credits.
- Assisted City Utilities' Program Manager with the City's 2022 annual stormwater report by providing statistics recorded from the Riparian department including volunteer hours, tons of debris/litter removed, and tons of woody debris removed.

• Forestry Report- January 2023

- Work continues to identify and prioritize planting sites in collaboration with the Southwest Area Partnership for spring tree planting. The spring planting will have an emphasis on planting street trees near elementary schools. There is substantial evidence that children who experience nature regularly (even if it is just a view of nature) perform better on tests of concentration, impulse inhibition, and delayed gratification.
- Most of the forestry team attended the 2023 Indiana Arborist Association Annual Conference. This conference offers an opportunity to learn from subject matter experts and network with others working in various capacities within the tree care industry.
- Began this year's collaboration with the Indiana Department of Natural Resources and the School Children Flower and Vegetable Association to deliver seedling trees to area 3rd graders. We are working on another potential partnership that will offer an education component to classes/teachers who are interested. This year, children will be receiving Pecan trees.
- In-house crew efforts were focused on high-priority service requests. At present, there are 5 outstanding priority-1 service requests, 15 priority-2 service requests, and 51 priority-3 service requests. 30 were completed in January.

- Forestry received 27, 311 Call Center service requests during December. Each of these reports is inspected and necessary work is prioritized based on the related risk.
- 16 tree damage appraisals were completed this month resulting in \$15,128.00 in total damages

↓ Planning Report – December 2022

- Minor value engineering and design changes continue in the Franke Park Renaissance: Phase I planning efforts. Tree clearing is anticipated for winter, with bidding on track for late January/early February.
- Limited construction continues for Riverfront Development: Phase IIA. Cold temperatures and wet weather have slowed efforts heading into the winter.
- Riverfront Development: Phase IIB planning and design continues, albeit with several ongoing challenges for the design team. Utility coordination, private development needs and requests, funding, interpretive signage, and permitting are at the forefront of discussions. 50% of Permit Application drawings were submitted for staff review at the end of the month.
- A contract was approved with Design Workshop for the Park's 10-year Comprehensive Plan. Project kick-off is scheduled for January.
- A pre-construction meeting was held with Stanger Group and Biohabitats, Inc. in anticipation of the St. Marys Streambank Stabilization: Phase II project. Construction is scheduled to begin in mid-January.
- Tree mitigation location and details were determined and submitted to IDNR for the Fourth St. Trestle Bridge project. Design development continues as the permit drawings are reviewed.
- Explored potential funding opportunities for upcoming park projects with Doug Nussbaum (IDNR) and Mike Cox (NRCS).
- Work continues regarding the addition and reorganization of personnel within the landscape division. Two new positions (working leader and Headwaters gardener) and one vacant position will be filled before spring 2023, while a new team structure is being explored to increase efficiency in landscape maintenance.
- Staff met regularly with Conservatory management to discuss various agreements, staff training, marketing, showcase, and facility operations. Progress continues to be made on the various capital projects within the facility that were discovered through the facility assessment and internal discussions. Of note is the development of an interior lighting upgrade project that is anticipated to be bid on in early 2023.

Horticulture and Landscape Report- December 2022

- Landscape staff spent a lot of time with limb pickup in various parks due to high winds.
- Fall clean-ups were completed at over 40 parks.
- Leaf removal and fall bed clean-ups continued at Promenade, Lakeside, and Foster Parks.
- Landscape staff mulched Rudisill Park.
- Landscape staff ground stumps in multiple landscape beds across various parks.
- Landscape staff assisted in snow removal and salting during the winter storm.
- Landscape staff began pruning ornamental trees in select parks; priority parks have been identified and will be completed as possible throughout the winter.
- Our last seasonal employees were separated on December 21st.
- Staff evaluations and goals were completed.
- Lawnscape completed its 2022 Maintenance Contract. Leaf cleanups were finished this month, as needed.

4 Riparian Management Report- December 2022

- Continued scouting for hidden navigational hazards along all three rivers.
- Coordination with Public Works for the removal of old debris around St Marys River levee.
- Recruitment and coordination of organizations for volunteer clean-ups for 2023 continuing, including opportunities for water quality presentations and education.

- Actively recruiting seasonal workers by contacting organizations and universities in preparation for 2023.
- Preparing for the continuation of the Parks Ecosystem Maintenance contract.

♣ Forestry Report- December 2022

- Pruning has been suspended and only special prunes will be considered for the time being. We were able to wind down storm operations by the end of this month, except for what remains in the parks. We did 68 special prunes as well as dead wooding of trees for clearance, failure potential, and visibility issues.
- 311 calls for December was 35. 2022 has been a record year for 311 calls since July. We have surpassed all 311 annual call totals from any previous year that records are available. We have a final count of 2,887, 311 calls for 2022. The highest yearly total before 2022 was 1,449 in 2021.
- Our inventory shows 60 trees were removed from the ROW (right of way). Many of these were contract removals that were verified as complete once we were notified by the contractor.
- 6 removals were storm-related. 2 storm removals were from parks. Private trees blocking streets were 1.5 removals were a result of vehicle damage.
- Forestry filled two positions, one was a groundman and the other a bucket operator. Presently there are a total of 5 field staff, 4 of which have CDL licenses.
- Forestry recorded 46 hangers and or debris picks up. 2 were a result of a vehicle collision.
- We recorded 20 call–inspections at properties that may be a future issue with the area resident's concerns.
- Tree inspections requested by risk management due to vehicle damage totaled 11 locations. 11 locations have been reviewed. The total tree damage appraised amount sent to risk was \$6,090.00.

♣ Botanical Conservatory Report – January 2023

Happy Smallidays' at the Botanical Conservatory continued to delight visitors through the tale of Little Mouse learning to take in the magic of the holiday season through to the end of the exhibit, which wrapped up on January 8. After a week of hard work and collaboration, 'California Dreamin' began welcoming visitors into a 1960s-1970s era inspired Venice Beach, Los Angeles, California on January 14. This winter exhibit looks to get families out of the winter blues and into the spirit of surf, sun, and sand, while the outdoors may have other plans, families can enjoy summer vibes and play at the Botanical Conservatory through April 16. The Botanical Conservatory hosted several well-received events in January 2023 including Winterval at the Conservatory (January 28), the unveiling of the Coast to Coast Art Display by Kerstin Glaess (Opened January 14), and the start of the Sweetheart Orchid Display (Opened January 31). Staff is gearing up for the Orchid Show (February 4), Kerstin Glaess Artist Reception (February 19), and several pre-registered programs and workshops throughout the month. Current vacancies include Program Coordinator, Education & Interpretation (interviewing), Camp ACTIVenture Counselors & Supervisor (accepting applications), Seasonal Maintenance (accepting applications), and Seasonal Gardener (accepting applications).

Conservatory KPIs

January 2023 was an incredibly strong opening to the year with an attendance increase of over 30% to the same period in 2022, and membership sales up nearly 57% to the same period in 2022. Rental & Catering Fee revenue increased precipitously year-over-year due to higher confidence in event booking, as well as a streamlined booking process. Conservatory Shop revenue somehow continues to climb, with an impressive 33% increase in January 2022 (which held the all-time January record for the Conservatory Shop). Overall a compelling exhibit theme and inspired execution have driven traffic in the first month of the year.


Conservatory Business Development

- ♣ The Botanical Conservatory was awarded \$5,000 support from the Magee O'Connor Foundation for the 2023 California Dreamin' Exhibit.
- The Conservatory received \$2,300 for support of the 2023 Color in Motion Butterfly Exhibit and \$1,200 for a memorial bench from Matthew Wyatt and his sisters Liz and Katherine in honor of their parents Jo Ann and William Wyatt. Jo Ann and William (Bill) both volunteered for many years for Conservatory special events and especially as butterfly attendants for the annual live butterfly display.
- ♣ Staff submitted a grant to the Ian and Mimi Rolland Foundation for \$7,500 support of the 2023 Color in Motion Butterfly Exhibit (the 20th anniversary of the display).

Staff confirmed media sponsorships of Conservatory's 2023 exhibits and special events: 21 Alive for the

Color in Motion Butterfly Exhibit and Mother's Day in the Garden; WMEE 97.3 for the Color in Motion Butterfly Exhibit; and Majic 95.1 for Bunny Tales in the Garden, Mother's Day Plant Sale, and Mother's Day in the Garden. Approved promotional spots for California Dreamin' Exhibit; promotional tickets were distributed to WANE 15 and 103.9 WAYNE FM for the exhibit and to all foundation sponsors.

- ♣ Conservatory donations in January 2022 totaled \$8,500: \$5,000 from the Magee-O'Connor Foundation and \$3,500 from the children of Jo Ann and William Wyatt.
- ♣ Researched possible grant funding from the Indiana Arts Commission for the 2023 Showcase Garden exhibits. The exhibits do not currently meet the criteria of the program. Staff will investigate again for a possible match in 2024 that will more closely align with the focus of their art.
- ♣ Staff coordinated information for the Winter 2023 Member ENews; it was sent on January 8.
- ♣ Staff completed the Fall 2022/Winter 2023 follow-up email appeal to our members and volunteers; it was sent on January 23.
- **↓** Conservatory Public Programs **Events**
- ₩interval at the Conservatory (January 28)
- Winterval held from 10:00 am-3:00 pm at the Conservatory attracted 581 visitors, 127 of which were members. A high number of additional memberships were purchased for the day as guests enjoyed activities in place to celebrate this park-wide winter festival. At the Conservatory, a live ice carving of a surfer riding a wave was performed on the sidewalk which winds through the newly developed front flower beds. Altogether, 300 plants, including thimble cacti, jade, and spider plants, were given away in Showcase, and 94 children with 95 adults enjoyed an Orgami craft of crabs and sailboats in Jaenicke.



- There was one field trip scheduled in January 2023 that was canceled because school was closed after heavy snow. There were two field trip groups in January 2022 totaling 28 students, 0 students from 0 groups in January 2021, 67 students from 1 group in January 2020, and 94 students from 2 groups in January 2019.

There were 0 adult groups who visited in January 2023 totaling 0 guests.


Bee the Change:

This showcase offers a view of a nostalgic bus, a boardwalk for photos, and many activities for the young and young-at-heart: a slide, sandboxes with accessories, Jenga, beach volleyball, ring toss, horseshoes, cornhole, and beach chairs with a whimsical "fire" pit.

- ♣ The final week of Happy Smallidays wrapped up on January 8. Visitation remained quite strong through the entirety of the holiday show—even through the new year.
- Over five days, Botanical Conservatory and Lawton Park staff (gardeners and MTs) worked together to deinstall

 Happy Smallidays and install the winter exhibit, California Dreamin'. California Dreamin' provides a fun and colorful space for families to bask in the warmth of a stunning beach-like environment replete with beach games, sunset scenes, sand, and a VW van.

- ♣ Sycamore Tree Care thoroughly pruned the loquat tree and two of the pillars covered in creeping ficus vines within the Showcase House. Later in the month, Sycamore Tree Care pruned several trees and palms in the Tropical House. The work they performed has greatly improved the aesthetic and health of the plants throughout the Botanical Conservatory.
- ♣ The Sweetheart Orchid display was installed at the end of the month in the Tropical House. It was completely redone this year—a welcome and much-needed transformation to provide a clean, contemporary, and aesthetically-pleasing display for visitors.
- ♣ Several Voodoo Lily corms were donated to the Botanical Conservatory—one with an emerging flower that was displayed for the public.

♣ Botanical Conservatory Report – December 2022

- 'Happy Smallidays' at the Botanical Conservatory continued to delight visitors through the tale of Little Mouse learning to take in the magic of the holiday season. 'Happy Smallidays' was produced by the Botanical Conservatory in collaboration with local author/illustrator Talitha Shipman as a children's storybook brought to life in this exciting twist on the Botanical Conservatory holiday exhibit. The Botanical Conservatory hosted several well-received events in December 2022 including Member-Volunteer Holi-Day (December 7), Santa & Reindeer Saturdays (December 3, 10, 17), and the second of two book signings with Talitha Shipman (December 17). Staff is gearing up for California Dreamin' Showcase Exhibit (Opening January 14), Seascapes Art Display by Kerstin Glaess (Opening January 14), Winterval (January 28), and Sweetheart Orchid Display (Opening January 31). Program Coordinator, Education & Interpretation, Kelsey Gerig, will be departing the Botanical Conservatory on March 1, the full-time position has been posted with the intent to interview and hire by the time of her departure. Kelsey has been an incredible asset in her time at the Botanical Conservatory, starting and developing Camp ACTIVenture, multiple workshops, and enhanced exhibit signage.
- Conservatory KPIs Conservatory Shop revenue showed a significant increase year-over-year due to a more compelling strategy for obtaining and displaying merchandise. Rental & Catering revenue has dramatically increased with the rebound of the special event industry from the impacts of COVID-19 and is trending up to 2019. December 2022 also charted a significant attendance increase to 2021 attributable to enhanced exhibit marketing and a compelling exhibit theme. During the year, overall attendance is marked at a post-COVID-19 high. While overall attendance is down to 2019 YTD, paid attendance figures are up 3.73% to 2019 YTD, indicating that more people are paying their way into the door during public hours. The increase in paid attendance to 2019 YTD indicates that free attendance is down, observed broadly in smaller rental events (down over 4,300 guests, or -61.2%) and a change in attendance-logging practices that omits facility attendance tracking at off-site events (over 9,200 visitors were recorded for off-site participation in Botanical Conservatory outreach in 2019). With the rental attendance drop and change in attendance tracking taken into consideration, attendance at the Botanical Conservatory is within 350 guests or -0.39% to 2019, indicating a near-full attendance recovery to pre-COVID-19

figures.


Education

Conservatory Facility and Maintenance

- Sound system repairs were made by Ryder Productions in the Atrium, Meeting Rooms, and Showcase Garden, resolving issues of distortion and weak sound levels. Future work is contemplated to extend sound system coverage throughout the Botanical Conservatory.
- Central Indiana Hardware will be installing new Front Doors and an ADA door opener at the center entrance in early 2023, replacing the Front Doors installed in 1994.

- Allied Mechanical is making progress with repairs to Boiler #2 and Chilled Water Piping at the Botanical Conservatory. They have also submitted a bid to replace the 1983 Dunham Bush chiller with a more efficient unit.
- Requests for quotation have been sent for wallpaper removal and painting projects in the Atrium and Conservatory Shop and are expected in January.

♣ Conservatory Landscape and Horticulture

- The Staff completely removed the existing rows of arborvitae adjacent to Calhoun Street in the Beverforden Garden. The arborvitae hedge created a public safety hazard due to limited sight lines. By removing the hedge, the area is safer, and more inviting, and allows for the opportunity to plant new and interesting species in the space for visitor enjoyment and public beauty.
- Second and third shifts of paperwhite narcissus and a second shift of poinsettias were planted in the Atrium and Showcase House to keep the Happy Smallidays exhibit fresh for visitor enjoyment. The new poinsettia tree irrigation system has been a major success in keeping the plants fresh, healthy, and evenly watered.
- With the assistance of Lawton garden staff, sand, and fibar were acquired and stored in a dry place in preparation for the California Dreamin' showcase installation.
- The current cohort of Anthis students completed their fall semester and their time volunteering at the Botanical Conservatory. During December, they assisted garden staff in planting the remaining daffodil and tulip bulbs in the Beverforden Garden. Anthis students and garden staff also installed and graded new soil to create an even level between the sidewalk and garden bed to enhance safety of pedestrians walking along Calhoun Street. A new cohort of students will be volunteering at the Botanical Conservatory starting in January.
- Ancient tree roots from area peat bogs were sourced and will be used in the upcoming California Dreamin' show. They will be part of permanent displays within the Tropical House at the conclusion of the California Dreamin' show.
- Plants have been selected and will be installed as part of the permanent collection in the Atrium. The permanent collection will add welcome color to the space and give a consistent, attractive appearance as visitors first enter the Conservatory. Planters will be used to add seasonal color such as poinsettias during the holidays.

Gary Whitacre – Manager, Golf Operations

- ♣ The golf courses appear to be in good shape as we near the start of the new season. To date, no unexpected weather that could damage or delay the courses has been experienced, and if anything the weather has been somewhat mild.
- Course opening dates are projected to be March 15/16/17, with one course opening each day at the Superintendent's discretion. If the weather is exceptionally good, these dates could move forward.
- ♣ Seasonal jobs for the golf courses were posted on January 27. Despite some confusion with the new system, applications have been good. A meeting was held with the course managers, and most employees from last year are expected back. At this time, we are determining how many new positions must be filled,

but do not expect to have any issues. A further escalation in the pay scale will affect our expenses and may lead to rate changes at the end of the season.

- 🖶 Fifteen new carts were ordered at the end of last season, and are expected to be delivered at some point later this summer. The timeline and availability of new carts have been and continue to be affected by supply chain issues. We are checking into ordering more carts already, as we continue to battle an aging cart fleet that is undersized to the point of not being able to keep up with customer demand.
- 🖶 Work continues to be done on gathering public input for the Foster Park renovation plan. The timing of the work that will affect the golf course is still uncertain.
- 🖶 Merchandise for the golf courses will begin arriving around the middle of March. The strategy is to grow the amount of merchandise slowly by stocking essentials and items that provide value and are unique to the courses. We will not be stocking high-ticket items like clubs and bags, with the goal being to turn saleable merchandise repeatedly while not carrying a high dollar-value inventory.
- 4 Golf continues to be gaining in popularity, and our numbers over the last two years show this. There is no reason to not be optimistic about 2023!

2022 Golf YEAR IN REVIEW

2022 showed solid gains from a revenue and play standpoint. Golf continues to grow in popularity, continuing an uptick that started during the COVID pandemic. Here are the year-over-year figures for golf revenue:

- 🔱 The total revenue shown at the top includes the range and alcohol revenue, it is broken down by course below the total figures.
- 4 The golf courses opened for the year on Wednesday, March 16. Weather was very suspect for several weeks, with unusually cold and wet conditions compared to the average. When the weather did cooperate, play and activity levels were strong. The worry at the time was that so many days (and weeks) were being lost to weather that revenue would not catch up to previous year levels.
- Once the weather broke, those fears proved unfounded. Overall, the weather was good for the season and stayed warm until early November. By the end of June, the courses had caught up and surpassed 2021 revenue levels. Activity levels stayed high, allowing for a gain in revenues.
- ♣ On June 13, a major weather event known as a derecho hit the area with extremely strong winds and rain. The Parks courses were very lucky compared to several area courses and received comparatively minor damage.

- As the season went along, golf cart failures began to be a recurring problem. It became apparent that batteries purchased in 2019 were failing at a rate far ahead of their life expectancy. A Purchase Order to acquire new batteries eventually got this situation under control, but the number of carts and their reliability continues to be a concern.
- 🖶 The number and condition of carts are becoming an issue. At Shoaff Park, in particular, not having functional carts is leading to a loss of revenue. It was suggested multiple times this summer during peak times that \$700-\$1,000 a day was walking out the door due to the lack of available carts.
- 👃 A purchase order was requested and granted for 15 new carts to continue updating and expanding the fleet. These carts will arrive in 2023.
- Shoaff Park closed for the season on November 4, and Foster and McMillen

- The Greenways and Trails Department continues to grow under the leadership of Dawn Ritchie, Greenways Manager, and Neil Miller, Program Manager. In 2022, 2.6 miles of trails were built in Fort Wayne, bringing the total to nearly 134 miles of trails in the regional network with 100 miles in the city limits.
- The primary functions of the Green ways Department include project development and management, overseeing volunteer programs, event administration, and coordinating trail maintenance and improvements.

2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Successfully secured a nearly \$2.8 million Next Level Trails Grant from the State of Indiana for the Pufferbelly Trail.
- Joined non-profit partners Fo1i Wayne Trails, Inc. and Fo1i Wayne Running Club to plan and cany out a new biweekly run/walk program called "Tread the Trails".
 - Leading into the year, The City of F01i Wayne was awarded the Fo1i Wayne Running Club's President's Award for its trail system and support of the running community.
- Paired with Humane Fmi Wayne and Fmi Wayne Trails, Inc. to implement the "Tails on Trails" program.
- Successfully organized or assisted with 27 Trek the Trails Rides, a Spring Forward Ride, Winterval Trek the Trails, a Winter Solstice bike ride/walk, and the Great American Cleanup.
- The Fifth Annual Open Streets event took place on August 7th, 2022 the first under Neil Miller's oversight.

- Over 300 volunteer hours were logged on the trails by Volunteer Greenway Rangers in 2022. The trails are currently patrolled by 71 active Greenway Rangers.
- Created a partnership with the Volunteer Center to help secure volunteers for our programs and events.
- Executed signage installation along the Beckett's Run Trail.
- Planted 74 native trees and shrubs and removed invasive Bradford Pear trees along the Towpath Trail with 30 volunteers, Fort Wayne Trails, and City staff during the Great Tree Canopy Comeback.
- Hosted a Bike-To-Work Day Breakfast to support active commuters.
- Organized and hosted two Trot the Trail equestrian events.
- Assisted with the development of equestrian trails.
- Assisted with the Pufferbelly 5K/l OK walk and run event.
- Coordinated the 2nd annual Renaissance Cruise In Car Show.
- Trail counts in 2022 were 724,807 trips with 20 trail counters. This was down from 2021's number of 764,665. A few reasons for the reduction in trail traffic might be severe storms in June and July that created closed sections of the trail until downed trees could be removed. Flooding in the spring is always a problem on the Rivergreenway. Also, the counter at the confluence of the three rivers showed much lower traffic due to the bridge work on Spy Run Avenue by the Old Fort. While the trail was still open, trail users had to use an at-grade crossing of Spy Run Avenue instead of the below-grade crossing. Some trail users avoided the area. The trail counter on the Rivergreenway at Riverfront had the highest counts. The Pufferbelly Trail between Cook and Carroll is a close second with the Salomon Farm Loop third and Foster Park loop fourth.
- 2.6 miles of trails were constructed inside the City limits with another 2.74 miles constructed outside the City limits for a total of 5.34 additional miles. The total miles of the Fort Wayne Area Trails network is now 134 miles with 100 miles inside the City limits. Keep in mind that we only had about 18 miles in the whole network (the Rivergreenway) in 2005. Most of the pathways in parks are NOT included in the 134 miles unless they are directly connected with the larger network.
- We are working diligently to secure permits and finish land acquisition to get these projects out to bid by March or April at the latest: Covington Rd Trail from Hadley to Getz; Liberty Mills Rd Trail from Middle Grove to Falls Drive; Summit Park Trail from the Fishing Line Trail to Lima Rd Trail along the south side of Ludwig Rd (named for the Summit Park Industrial Park).
- ♣ Please see attached 2022 Accomplishments and 2023 Goals for the Greenways Department.
- Lity of Fort Wayne Greenways & Trails Department, Fort Wayne Parks & Recreation and Fort Wayne Trails, Inc will host our fourth annual Winter Solstice Walk and Bike Ride on 12/21 at Salomon Farm and the Pufferbelly Trail at 4:30 p.m. We'll have food, a bonfire, and entertainment afterward.
- The Trine Engineering students have completed their mid-block crossing study for trails in Fort Wayne and will give a presentation on their findings at Trine on 12/9 at 10 a.m. Our working group will meet on 12/12 to discuss the Trine findings and make a decision on which treatment we will use consistently on our trail mid-block crossings of roads.
- We continue to acquire the right of way for the Covington Road: Hadley to Getz and Liberty Mills Rd: Middle Grove to Falls Drive/Coventry Lane trail projects. Both projects will be bid out in early 2023.
- We have begun the appraisal process on the Pufferbelly Trail from Ley Road to Lima/Ice Way. We anticipate the acquisition of the 12 parcels to be completed in the fall of 2023, then we will bid on the project (Washington Center Rd to the intersection of Lima Rd and Ice Way).

Hanna Street Trail from Rudisill to Pettit is complete. We just need to check the trail before accepting the contractor's work. Hanna from Pettit to Decatur Rd is under construction. The concrete trail from Pettit to Humane Fort Wayne has been poured. The rest of the trail from Humane FW to Decatur Rd will be asphalt and will be paved in the spring.
