



History:

Prior to becoming a park, the site currently known as Bob Arnold Northside Park was occupied by the Indiana School for Feeble-Minded Youth. The facility included a very large school building, along with several other buildings including an industrial arts building, a hospital, and a gymnasium. The school was opened in 1890 and residents came from all over the state. In 1931, the legislature changed the school's name to the **Fort Wayne State School**.


Timeline of the Park:

- 1960, a new facility was completed at Stellhorn and St. Joe Roads and many residents moved to the new site.
- 1979 The land was deeded to the city.
- 1981 a bond package was secured to fund a project to convert the site to a city park.
- 1982 The State School Administration Building was demolished.
- 1983 The park officially opened on June 4.
- 1999 The name was changed from Northside Park to Bob Arnold Northside Park after the retirement of Bob Arnold, a previous long standing Director of the Fort Wayne Park & Recreation Department, who retired with 45 years of service to the city.














KLUG PARK





KREAGER PARK

History:

Kreager Park was formerly known as the Seyfert Farm property (an old potato farm) which was purchased with Land & Water Conservation funds in 1967 and included 110 acres of land. An additional 62 acres were acquired in 1992 in an exchange with Allen County for land from Johnny Appleseed Park. At that time the park was known as Maumee Park.

A \$5 million dollar donation from Gale Kreager transformed the former potato farm into a park and the name of the park was then changed to Kreager Park in 1994.

Then later, in 1997, an additional 51 acre farm field south of North River Road was donated to the Parks Department by Mr. Thomas and Debra Meyer which brought the park's acreage up to just over 218 acres.




THE PARK TODAY

Today Kreager Park is a true destination park that provides a wide variety of recreational amenities. These include:

- Softball Fields (4)
- Soccer Fields (7 full-size, 2 with lights, 3 half-size)
- Tennis Courts (8)
- Playgrounds (3, Including Taylor's Dream)
- Outdoor Adult Fitness Equipment
- Splashpad (1)
- Shelters (2)
- Walking Trails (.95 mile loop)
- Natural Open Spaces







LAKESIDE PARK

LAKESIDE PARK

History:

- 1908 Land for this 23.8 acre landscape was purchased.
- 1911 Excavation for lagoons began.
- 1916 A refectory pavilion is constructed.
- 1921 Superintendent of Parks Adolphe Jaenicke designs the sunken gardens.
- 1925 An Italianate sunken garden and pergola are built.
- 1928 the garden was named a National Rose Garden.
- 1928 Tennis courts are installed.

The uncredited 1912 master plan for Lakeside Park is likely the work of renowned landscape architect, George Kessler, who designed the Park and Boulevard Plan for Fort Wayne the same year.

Throughout the park walks connect to the nearby street grid. Historic photographs reveal ornate furniture and flowerbeds. Four lagoons, both natural and excavated, are featured in the original plans, along with serpentine paths, a curvilinear drive, and bridges leading to islands in the lagoons.




Figure 1.5 View of the Boathouse and recreational water equipment extant at the time of the creation of Lakeside Park, 1908. Courtesy Allen County Public Library, 00001492.





Figure II.7 View from a bridge down a shaded lagoon toward the pergolas of the Sunken Garden.

THE PARK TODAY


Today Lakeside Park is an example of unrivaled park beauty. In 2005 the sunken garden area was reconstructed with new sidewalks, brick pavers, concrete pools, steps, and walls. At the same time the wood pergola was rebuilt to conform to the original design.

- Major General Henry W. Lawton Monument















LIONS PARK

History:

Lions Park was a gift from The Central Lions Club of Fort Wayne and has been a Fort Wayne attraction since 1953. Its nearly 15 acres are tucked away in a scenic northside neighborhood not far from Hazelwood Post Office and Fire Station Number 10. The Lion monument was dedicated in memory of Henry and Wilhelmine Franke.



THE PARK TODAY

Lions Park is a suburban oasis tucked away among the trees in a quiet neighborhood. It is a place enjoyed by neighborhood kids and is a popular place to enjoy sport activities.

- Open recreational green space









History:

Nearly all of Shoaff Park's land was purchased in 1955 with a generous donation by Mr. and Mrs. Fred B. Shoaff. The Conklin Pavilion was a gift from Mrs. Ella Conklin left to Fort Wayne's residents as part of her last will and testament. Though Shoaff Park's most distinguishing feature is the natural beauty of its wooden areas, it is also distinguished by the fact that is offers the most amenities of any park.
