# **History of the SCFVA**

School Children's Flower and Vegetable Association Fort Wayne, Indiana

In the early 1920's, Fort Wayne Park Superintendent Adolf Jaenicke began organizing a program with the Fort Wayne Chamber of Commerce that would provide school children with potted plants. According to minutes from October 5, 1923, Board of Park Commissioners instructed Mr. Jaenicke that "plants be propagated in our greenhouse and later be distributed among school children throughout the city". The first distribution of plants took place in 1927, and the plant display by participating students was held at the courthouse. In 1928 flower seeds and in 1929 vegetable seeds were made available for purchase to be grown and included in the display. Mrs. John Memmewisch served as the first president of what eventually came to be known as the School Children's Flower and Vegetable Association. Under her leadership the constitution was written to include all children in public and parochial schools.

After the first display of plants at the courthouse, the location was moved to Central High School where it was held until 1954. Because the number of entries grew considerably, the venue moved to the Memorial Coliseum. This change brought complications to the show as each school wanted their own exhibit. In 1958 the association was disbanded with the "sincere hope that a new organization might be formed that would sponsor the continuation of the program".

The Park Board maintained the program through 1961 when a reorganized SCFVA was formed. A new constitution was adopted, elections were held, and a new era of the plant show had begun! Through volunteer efforts, plants and seeds are distributed to elementary school children in the spring and in the fall each school has their own plant show. All blue-ribbon winners from each school are eligible to participate in a City-Wide Blue-Ribbon Recognition Day Show. Over the years, this Blue-Ribbon show has been held at Franke Park, Blackhawk Middle School and its current location at McMillen Community Center.

More than 60 schools, including homeschool groups, participate in the SCFVA program. The Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation Department grows and distributes more than 19,000 potted plants each spring and many packets of flower, vegetable and herb seeds are sown by participating children.

According to the SCFVA by-laws, the purpose of the association is to "further education in the Nature Study Theory, growing flowers, plants and vegetables, molding characteristics of worth in making citizens of the future." We hope to continue working to improve the interest in nature that is inherent in children.

## **Chairperson's Flower, Plant and Vegetable Show Checklist**

#### **Before School Begins**

- Double check your school show date with your school principal and/or PTA president. Contact the SCFVA president, flower show chairperson or the park board advisor if you have questions.
- Put a notice about the school flower show in the school registration packets for students in grades 1 – 5.

#### A Week Before Your School Show

- Arrange with your principal the location of tables for displaying entries well in advance.
- Call judges before the show to confirm show date, time and location in the building.
- Count your ribbons to make sure you have enough. If the Statistics Form was used the previous year it is a good source for this information.
- Hang posters to announce show.
- Plan on having helpers. You could have many entries the morning of your school show. To make it easier on yourself, parents, and students you may want to allow students to bring in entries after school the day before your show.
- A few days before the show, announce the show and send home entry forms (page # 7)
- Make the show fun! Have a category for the "goofiest" vegetable or the "smallest" plant.

### Important Dates for 2024:

#### Thursday, January 18 – Chairperson Meeting

Distribute Page 3 (It's Time to Order Seeds and Shirts!) to students in grades K - 4. Seed sales are not restricted to children. Encourage staff, family and friends to buy seeds.

#### Monday February 12

Order deadline for seeds, T-shirts, pencils and ribbons. Send ONE check made out to SCFVA with Page 4 (Current year Order Form) completed to Lynda Heavrin at the address on the bottom of page. Keep a copy for your records. BE SURE to include the requested show date, as it is on a first-come, first-serve basis. Your school show must be completed prior to the Blue Ribbon Show.

#### Monday April 1

Seed, ribbon, T-shirt and pencil pickup at the Lawton Park Maintenance Office, 1900 N. Clinton. Orders will be available beginning this day and will be held until plants are delivered. The office is open M - F 7:30 a.m. - 3 p.m. and after hours by appointment.

#### April 22-26

Plants delivered to schools ((refer to schedule in handbook). Distribute Pages 5 & 6, the seeds, plants and any T-shirts ordered to students. It might be helpful to collect bread bags to use them to hold plants being sent home. Paper lunch sacks work well too.

Get everyone involved! Even if they did not grow seeds or their plant died, let students and teachers bring in a favorite plant. All these categories can get Green Thumb ribbons or special prizes.

#### Day Before the Show

- Leave copies of the information page and entry forms in the school office on pages 7 and 8.
- Have a designated space for each possible category on the tables.
   Label the categories. Separate the potted plants by 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> year or more. Within each year, separate into groups of like plants.
- Have extra containers like paper plates, cups, or tin cans in case a student needs help in displaying his/her entry. A container like a milk jug from home for watering may be helpful. Other needed supplies include a fabric tape measure to measure size categories, scissors or pruners for trimming entries, stapler and tape for securing entry forms.

#### Day of the Show

 Have copies for the Entry Form ready for students to complete. Try to be aware of all entries coming into the show. It is the responsibility of the chairperson and helpers to make sure entries are correct. If a child has incorrectly entered a category, advise about how to enter correctly. Be sure that each entry is properly tagged and the child's name is concealed before the judges arrive. Entry categories are listed on page 7 of this handbook.

- A student may have only one entry in each category. However, a student may enter as many categories as desired.
- Only students in grades 1 5 are eligible to be judged by SCFVA judges and are qualified to take their entries to the City-Wide Blue Ribbon Show.
- Have copies of the Judging Comment Sheets (page 15 of Handbook) available for judges.
- Make sure every Blue Ribbon winner receives a copy of the Congratulations form (page 11 of Handbook).
- Please fill out the Statistics Form (pages 13-14 of the Handbook). This will be very helpful when ordering ribbons for the next year.
- Each school will receive a plant designated as a "Principal Plant" so that he/she can participate in the show.
- Congratulate yourself, your helpers, the students for helping with a program that brings together school staff, parents and children in the common goal of growing something special!

#### Thursday, August 8

School Chairperson's Clinic at the Botanical Conservatory. See the current year's plant material and discuss how to create a fun show. Learn about judging criteria.

#### Late August/Early September

School Plant Show time! Remind students of your school's upcoming show. Send page 7, front and back, home with students in grades 1 – 5. It has detailed information about the school show, including entry forms. Copy page 9 for more entry forms available the day of show.

## How Ribbons are Awarded

- 1. A blue ribbon (1<sup>st</sup> place) is awarded in every category in which there is an entry.
- 2. Only one blue ribbon can be awarded in each category. However, multiple red (2<sup>nd</sup>), yellow (3<sup>rd</sup>), and orange (4<sup>th</sup>) place ribbons can be awarded. All entries receive ribbons.
- 3. The plant tags that came with the plant are not necessary for entering a plant and a missing tag does not disqualify the plant from receiving a ribbon. The tags are only used for judging if there are two completely equal plants in competition for 1<sup>st</sup> place.
- 4. Only the entries are judged, not the containers, for all the categories.

## **Frequently Asked Questions**

- Q. May I enter a plant that I received in another year or from another Fort Wayne School?
- A. Yes, it does not matter and you may enter it in the school you are attending now.
- Q. What if my plant died or did not do well?

A. Even if you did not get the results you wished for your plant bring it anyway. You might even get a blue ribbon if yours is the only entry in that category. If your plant died but you have another plant you cared for through the summer bring that plant to your school's show and enter it in the "My Favorite Plant" category.

Q. How many categories may I enter?

A. You may bring back all your plants that you have received from the SCFVA program no matter how old the plant since there is a 4<sup>th</sup>+ Year category. You may also enter any or all the seed categories depending on what you grew.

### Vegetables

All vegetables entered for appearance should be clean and free of blemishes.

Tops of carrots and beets should be cut back to 1".

Corn husks of corn should be pulled back and tied.

Entries for size are judged only for size.

Giant sunflower seeds are judged in the vegetable category for maturity, symmetry and the overall pattern. The yellow florets in the center of the flower head should be removed so seeds can be judged.

When entering in the "3 Alike" category the vegetables should be similar in size and color.

## How SCFVA Entries are Judged

### Flowers

Cut flowers should be blemish-free and are judged for freshness, richness of color, symmetry and health of the foliage.

When entering in the "3 Alike" category the flowers should be similar in size and color.

### Herbs

Cut and potted herbs should be blemish-free and are judged for freshness and color.

### **Potted Plants**

All plants should be properly groomed with discolored leaves and flowers removed.

The blooming plants, Jacobinia, Begonia and Geraniums, are judged first for health of the plant and overall balance of growth and second for the flowers.

Foliage plants, Asparagus Fern, Spider Plant, Umbrella Plant, Strawberry Begonia, and Coleus are judged for well-developed and abundant foliage.

The Coleus flowers and Spider Plant and Strawberry Begonia "babies" may be left on the plant.
